
## **MINISTERIAL SEARCH UPDATE**

In the last month, the Search Team has expanded its search in several ways:

- We posted the position on Indeed and ZipRecruiter. Thus far, no viable candidates have applied. We rejected those from foreign countries (Kenya, Guyana), those with non-ministerial backgrounds (human resource specialists, chaplains, school counselors, etc), those with incompatible theological approaches, and one whose resume looked promising but whose language skills were sub-par.
- No new leads have been received from UUA.
- Jack Kennedy contacted three of his previous ministers who said they would direct colleagues who are looking to All Faiths. We are hopeful this will bring qualified candidates to us. If you have contacts in other congregations, please reach out to them.
- We have started exploring the possibility of tapping into UUA's Commissioned Lay Minister (CLM) program to serve the congregation while the search for an ordained minister continues. The CLMs have to complete a three-year training program that focuses on skills such as pastoral care, community outreach, sermon delivery, staff supervision, committee work, and conflict resolution.
- We have placed an ad in the Fall/Winter issue of UUA's World magazine. It is widely read by thousands of UUs ... and by UU ministers.

We, like you, are hopeful that we can find an appropriate candidate to fill All Faiths' pulpit.

## **CLIMATE ACTION TEAM NEWS**

At the Climate Action Team meeting in June, there was a surprise guest participant: the City of Fort Myers Director of Public Affairs, Liz Bello-Matthews. Liz will be the guest speaker at our next CAT meeting at 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 12th when she will discuss her

work with the city government in detail. She joined us at the June meeting to begin getting acquainted. Liz has been working with the City of Fort Myers for two years. Previously, she was with the City of Miami Beach government where she was instrumental in bringing Florida East Coast communities together in addressing environmental issues, such as sea level rise, in a collaborative effort known as Resilient 350. Liz is a strong proponent of collaborative action and looks forward to connecting with CAT and our many partners.

She has a business background in both marketing and communications and worked at Samsung before entering public service. Fort Myers recently received a grant for keeping our waterways clean. However, she wants to talk to the community about more than our waters. She knows the audience is out there, if she can find ways to talk to them. She emphasized that it's okay when people disagree. Her information is very data driven and can help overcome misconceptions. She also talked about cooperation between city and county governments as we address major environmental issues such as clean water. Lee County recently received a grant of 1.1 billion dollars to address resiliency issues. She encourages us to be outspoken about securing funds to help consumers strengthen homes and become more impact-resistant. She is eager to work with us on important environmental issues.

Your Climate Action Team has long been focused on the importance of building alliances. We welcome this opportunity to strengthen our relationship with local government and to find ways to engage in collective action.

We invite all of you to join us at our July meeting to learn more about how we can work with the City of Fort Myers to help our community grow in climate resilience and justice.

The Homeless Team meets on the 3rd Thursday of the month at 1:00 pm at All Faiths. Anyone interested in helping a dynamic group of all Faiths members is welcome to attend/join our group. FMI: contact Barb McFarlane or Judy Alberda.

Our Team has a number of projects in progress – new ideas are always appreciated!

1. A sleeping bag collection for the 2023-2024 winter season is underway to assist Matt Wallace and the Lee County Coalition for the Homeless. We search area thrift shops and the facebook marketplace looking for clean, usable bags. As of 6-2-23, we have collected 13 sleeping bags, 3 of which are suitable for taller/larger people. Last year, All Faiths donated 30 sleeping bags, we hope to acquire as many as we can find again this year.

2. Various Team members researched Fort Myers area homeless shelters to identify a facility that we could offer assistance to. We identified the Fort Myers Rescue Mission on MLK Blvd. This is an 85 bed (men only) shelter in need of anything we can donate. Our Team collected all manner of clothing, bed & bath linens, kitchen ware, household misc. and books. These items were donated via 3 deliveries.

3. In the fall, we are planning a sock & toiletry drive at All Faiths. We are hopeful that our members will donate these items to help us fill this ever growing need.

4. We have a "Hats for Homeless Women" project in progress. Women who are sleeping "rough" in the colder months will benefit from a warm, hand-knitted hat. Each hat will be placed in a gallon zip bag. Additional items will be added to the bag, and the bags will be distributed by the Lee County Coalition for the homeless. We currently have 30 hats and have begun to collect items such as: hand sanitizer, playing cards, socks, toothpaste, deodorant & wash cloths. Just a note to say "Thank You" to everyone who donated yarn !!!

5. Bicycles... continue to be collected and delivered to All Souls for refurbishment and distribution to homeless individuals. If you have a bike in any condition, or can obtain a bike, please donate it to the All Faiths Bike Rack in front of our building. If you need help transporting a bike to All Faiths, please contact Barb McFarlane.

6. Lastly, Judy Alberda is in contact with the All Souls Housing Ministry Leader who would like to give a "message" at All Faiths in the Fall. Details to follow as they become available.

## A WORD FROM OUR RACIAL EQUITY TEAM

This summer, while the Racial Equity Team is in transition, we will continue to meet as usual on the second Tuesday of each month.

#### **Our Summer Theme: Collaborative Cooperation**

Developing and implementing a "racial" anything is hard work. We invite you to join us as we explore the 7 Principles of Kwanzaa, important pillars to African, and more specifically, Africans of the diaspora, that are most dominant in the Americas.

Kwanzaa is an annual holiday affirming African family and social values that is celebrated primarily in the United States from December 26 to January 1. Both the name and the celebration were devised in 1966. Kwanzaa was created during a time of social uprisings against racism, and was to re-establish community and to enlighten African Americans of their African culture. ### LIFE NEWS & UPDATES

All Faiths' LIFE 2023-24 activities (Fall 2023 through Spring 2024) will begin with your Team Leads participating in Team Leader Training in August. All Faiths' house parties will be scheduled for late September/early October. Input from those gatherings and house parties held by other LIFE congregations will be used to identify commonly held social justice concerns.

LIFE's Fall gathering, formerly called the Annual Assembly, has been re-named the Community Problems Assembly. At that October 24, 2023 assembly, input from all congregations' network members will determine what issue(s) LIFE will focus on for the 2023-24 cycle.

In May, the Board had re-formed the Affordable Housing Action Team into a more informal ad hoc housing committee. Since then, it has become apparent that the City is not forthcoming about how the Affordable Housing Trust funds are being used. Therefore, LIFE's Board recommends that the AHAT be re-constituted with a focus of pushing the City to build brick and mortar affordable housing for low-income families rather than using the funds only for workforce housing. Although housing will continue to be a focus, an additional issue identified through the house party and Community Problems Assembly process can also be pursued.

- Revenue/Operating Income and Expenses:
- Our Pledge Goal from April to May was \$33,919.00; and \$24,117.04 was received (71.1%). However, some congregants pledge was received at the end of the last fiscal year (during the pledge drive); that amounted to \$22,600.00. Factoring in those funds, we have received a total of \$46,717.04 towards the Pledge Goal. Thank you for your generosity!
- Since Hurricane Ian, with available funds from the UUA and our insurance carrier, the roof and gutters have been replaced. Interior renovations have been recently authorized for ceiling repairs and new kitchen countertops and we anticipate the work will be done in June/July 2023.
- Several new accounts were created at Live Oak to generate increased interest income. The 1 Year CD rate is 5.0%. And the Savings rate is currently at 4.0%.
- The monthly transfer/deposit of \$1,250.00 to the Live Oak Capital Reserve account was made. No Capital Reserve expenses were incurred. However, a contract has been issued to repave the parking lot and we are waiting for the work to be scheduled.
- In May, \$250.00 was collected for All Souls Episcopal Church (Heart for the Homeless Team)



## **UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY REPORT**

Sharon Gray, Marsha Bates, and Chris Stotler served as All Faiths' on-site delegates at UUA's 2023 General Assembly; Albie Johnson attended on-line. GA is always an exciting, spiritually invigorating, tiring, and sometimes frustrating experience. This year was no different.

The music during worship services and breaks was outstanding and there were many inspiring speakers. We witnessed the wide-ranging depth and quality of UU talent. As in other years, there many informative. were thought-provokingworkshops available to delegates; however, the frequent business sessions dominated our time and precluded our participation in many of the workshops. Fortunately, many of the workshops were recorded and we have the option of watching them on-line.

The two biggest business actions actions were the election of President for the next six years and the Article II amendment/approval process. Before her election, now-President Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt was impressive when articulating her positions on issues and her ambitions for the future of the UUA. We were happy she was elected President by such a large majority (95%+).

Part of GA 2023's Article II process was to determine whether the Article II language proposed by the Study Commission would be accepted as is or whether it should be amended. Before GA, delegates were allowed to submit proposed amendments. Of the 80 that the delegates submitted, 15 were selected to be discussed and voted on at the assembly. It is unclear how the Board determined which of the 80 submitted amendments would be presented to the GA at large.

Marsha and Chis each had submitted an amendment ... both would have kept the 7 Principles as they are currently written and added the 8th Principle and one also included the Sources in the revised version of Article II. Neither of their amendments were included in the 15 presented to the delegates for their vote. UUA's Article II Study Commission stated that they are opposed to lists (such as the Principles and Sources) because lists always leave something out. They feel their proposed paragraphs explain the Principles and Sources more fully.

The remaining 13 amendments discussed and voted on at GA addressed small (but sometimes important) word changes such as adding "peace."

UUA's Article II Study Commission members had worked on the Article II revision for two years, spending countless hours meeting with select congregations, holding workshops, and hashing out the revised language that is being proposed. They are understandably committed to the adoption of their proposed language. Although they spoke in support of a few amendments, they spoke in opposition to most of them. At times, they were aggressively defensive which was disappointing. We had anticipated having conversations with the Commission members and thought they would listen and be more willing to compromise.

Another controversial resolution discussed and voted on involved a proposal by some young adults that would require complete divestiture of all stocks or mutual funds that included fossil fuel companies or companies supporting the fossil fuel industries that are currently held in UUA's Endowment Fund. Included in this resolution was a requirement that all funds generated by selling these positions (~\$14 million) would be used for paying reparations to a wide range of groups. Chris was one of the few delegates who spoke before the assembly summarizing (in 90 seconds) his opposition to the idea of using the proceeds from the sale to pay reparations. Chris emphasized that both divestiture and paying reparations are important actions that UUA should undertake. However, not reinvesting the proceeds into the endowment fund would be financially irresponsible; it would violate the Board's fiduciary responsibility to

invest endowment funds for long-term preservation of principle and growth. Additionally, many UUA congregations have given their endowment funds to UUA to invest which maximizes their return on their investment. Many of those congregations rely on the interest they earn to pay for their on-going programs and to defray their operating expenses. After it was discussed the proposed amendment failed to pass, the youth staged a demonstration during the session.

Delegates selected three Actions of Immediate Witness (AIWs):

• Stop Cop City – to advocate that the huge law enforcement training center that is planned for Atlanta, GA should not be built.

• Protect the Dreamers with a pathway to permanent residence status

• Organizing for health equity for all

All Faiths, like many congregations, have been in an "information vacuum" about the Article II process. Absent a minister, we don't have anyone who is involved in UUA "politics" or closely follows UUA current events through connections with Headquarters or with the Southern Region. Many delegates said they had learned about Article II through sermons their ministers had preached throughout the year.
