BOARD NOTES by Chris Stotler, Chair

The Board meeting was held on Wednesday, May 15, 2019 at 1:00 p.m.

The Board had another productive meeting as we looked at issues affecting us currently and in the future. All board members were present except Ed Elrod and Chris Stotler, who were traveling. Chris participated by phone. Barbara Gaiser recorded the minutes for Ed, and Doug Cartwright chaired the meeting for Chris.

The Board clarified the issue about serving food at functions with the understanding that the cost will be reimbursed by the church. If a committee sponsors a meal and expects to be reimbursed for the cost of food and beverages, then they should sell tickets in advance to cover the expenses. If it is a fundraiser, the fundraising committee will set the ticket prices. This will reduce unforeseen expenses being incurred when fewer people attend than had been anticipated.

The Board heard a presentation from a solar energy company (Clifford Mitchem of CREW) regarding the possibility of placing solar panels on our roof and how we could utilize existing roof space for solar energy management. His project overview provided a financial analysis with cost breakdowns, potential income generated by selling excess energy produced, long-term savings, and pricing for our building. The system would be sized to provide 90% of our current average electricity usage for a cost about equal to our current monthly cost.

Savings are realized after the system is paid off and by avoiding the steady increase in electricity costs over the 30-year life of the system. As an added incentive, his company pledged to make a \$500.00 donation to our congregation for every referral they get from All Faiths. The Board will be evaluating presentations from other solar energy companies. Utilizing solar energy is a concrete way to demonstrate to the community our commitment to being good environmental stewards while reducing our energy costs. Any final decision on solar panel installation will consider long-term plans for our space.

The Board recognizes that there are many Sundays when we are at capacity in our current space. Actions will be needed in the future if we are to continue to grow. Growth is also limited by our restricted parking situation. The Board will continue to focus on these issues in future meetings.

Peter Erickson reported on a meeting recently held with an architect to review options that would better utilize our building space or whether there was potential for expansion. He also reported on a review conducted of nearby properties that could potentially be utilized for extra parking. One potential lot was identified and a letter sent to the owner, but no response had been received at the time of the Board meeting.

As many of you know, Howard Silverman present-

I hope you'll consider embarking on this journey with us. If you have trouble accessing a copy, a limited number of copies will be available. A facilitated group discussion will occur in the fall. Therese Hogle Member Since February 2019



Attracted by the warmth she feels when she enters All Faiths, Therese Hogle joined our congregation in February 2019.

She was raised in Minoa, NY, a suburb of Syracuse, on a small, 7.5 acre farm that was located next to a gravel pit. Although her father, who was a machinist by day, attempted to plant a garden to help feed his grow-

ing family, the ground was so rocky it broke the rototiller blades. Eventually, he realized it was more profitable to sell the gravel that lay just beneath the surface than to grow a garden. Her mother worked as an RN for 30 years.

The farm did support about 90 apple trees, so Therese spent many of her summers playing in the orchard with her siblings (she was number 6 of 12 children) or playing Tarzan in the vine-laden woods located across the street.

Therese earned an Associate's in Administration of Justice, and a Bachelor of Criminal Justice degree, intending to work as a corrections officer in the prison system. However, the summer she was completing her BA, there was a prison breakout; the prisoners took a female guard hostage and threw her off a bridge, killing her. That incident made Therese re-think her career options.

For 25 years, she sold phone services and equipment to businesses. Because it was a cyclical market, about every eight years, she was furloughed. Tiring of the inevitable lay-offs, Therese earned a Master of Adult Education degree and landed a job at the State University of New York's Educational Opportunity Center (SUNY EOC) located in Syracuse, NY. For about ten years, she administered the Test Accessing Secondary Completion (formerly known as the GED) to disadvantaged adults (school drop-outs, disabled citizens, former prisoners, e.g.) who had completed courses and training at the EOC.

Since retiring, Therese has become a snowbird, happily escaping the northern winters. In a couple of years, her wife, Joan Weiser, will retire and join Therese in her annual migration. Therese has a son who lives in Fort Myers and a daughter who lives in Minoa with Therese and Joan. However, her daughter is adamant that she will not become a snowbird, saying Florida is too hot and buggy!

Therese, who had been raised Roman Catholic, parted ways with that religion because of its treatment of women. She questioned why women were only allowed in the altar area to dust or vacuum... but were not allowed to officiate. The Catholics' refusal to recognize lesbian relationships also drove her away from the church. Therese characterizes herself as being an atheist for 30 years.

Joan, who was raised a fundamentalist Christian, wanted to attend church after she and Therese got together. Therese was uncertain about finding a church that would accept a lesbian couple. She found a website that asked a series of questions about one's philosophy and spiritual beliefs. After she completed the questionnaire, the website indicated that UU-ism would be a perfect fit for Therese. She has come to realize that if she were to establish her own religion, it would have the same principles and focus on spirituality as the UU faith.

When Therese and Joan attended the May Memorial UU Society in Syracuse, they were warmly welcomed. Since joining, they have become active members; Therese has served on the church board and was a member of the religious education council. Joan also has served on the board and as treasurer.

Therese stays busy while in Florida. She has a wide circle of friends and relatives and serves as chauffeur for a friends' two children... taking them to school and doctor's appointments, etc. This prevents her participation in daytime meetings at the church... and the evening events always seem to fall on a night when she has another commitment.

She looks forward to getting to know her fellow congregants. Therese is a delightful conversationalist. When you welcome her to the congregation, ask her to tell you how General Pershing played a significant role in getting her parents together!

CHANGES COMING TO LIFE?

As most of you know, All Faiths has been a part of Lee Interfaith for Empowerment (LIFE) for the past six years.

This year we had a record 65 people show up for the Nehemiah Action where Mayor Henderson and County Commissioner Frank Mann promised to work with LIFE on affordable housing issues going into the future, and re-fund an affordable housing trust fund that had been in place but not active for years.

LIFE has successfully tackled, researched and changed issues of injustice in our community. It is undeniable, and commendable, that they have made systemic changes that we, as individuals, would not be able to achieve.

Doing justice is not easy, comfortable, or cheap. All Faiths pays LIFE dues, based on our operating expenses and incorporated into our budget, of \$2,000 a year. Additionally, many of you have made personal investments, for which we are grateful.

In August, LIFE will be making changes to help alleviate some of the responsibilities of the team leaders. One of those changes will be to have an organizer working directly with All Faiths to recruit justice network members and schedule house parties in September.


