## ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

Budget Q&A Prior to the Meeting March 8 at 10 A.M. (see page 6) The Board meeting was held on February 19, 2020.

The February meeting had a busy agenda as we prepared for the March 22th Annual Meeting.

Actions taken at the meeting included:

- The Goal Budget used by the Stewardship Committee during the pledge drive was approved as the proposed budget that will be presented to membership for approval at the annual meeting. The Finance Committee had made line item changes to the budget but the total for income and expenses remained the same at \$237,980.
- The board approved a request from the Nominating Committee to request a waiver of the one-year membership requirement for board membership as an action at the annual meeting. Two candidates who have been active and involved for over a year in our congrega-

- tion but who have been members for less than a year, are nominated. The congregation will have to approve the suspension of the one-year membership requirement for this year only for the two nominees for the positions of Treasurer and Director.
- Planning is underway for the Auction Night on March 28th starting at 5:30. Mark it on your calendar. This is a major fund-raiser for All Faiths and its success is critical to our ability to meet our annual budget. Forms are available for donations for the silent auction, live auction and raffles.
- The board voted to have the starting time for the service at 10:30 A.M. when we return to one service.
- Our air-conditioning unit sprung a leak and the cost of repairs will probably exceed \$2,000.
- Wish List items: our street flags need to be replaced. If

you would like to make a special contribution toward the flag replacement please see Regina.

■ The development of the Five-Year Plan is continuing. Part of this effort has included working with an architect to determine options available and the feasibility of modifying our building to provide two classrooms, bathroom improvements to meet ADA requirements, and a small increase in seating capacity. A meeting with City of Fort Myers officials was held on February 20 to discuss our options and their concerns. They identified several challenging requirements to be considered as we continue the planning process.

Although our budget situation has improved during the past two months, the income received thus far for the year is about 10% below the income estimated in the budget for the first ten months of our fiscal

year. Expenses to date have been lower than estimated, but we are still about \$3,000 in the red. It is critical that we have a successful fund-raiser and that pledge and plate donations are very good during the final two months of the fiscal year to end with a balanced budget.

Please contact me or any board member if you have items for our next board meeting.

Our next board meeting will be March 18 at 1:00 p.m. Members are welcome to observe.

#### FROM McGregor Boulevard

At the time of this writing, I have just said goodbye to a dear friend visiting from England. While at university, I worked each summer in the Catskill Mountains at a camp for people with developmental disabilities. It was here I met people from around the world, many who remain good friends. Thirty-two years later my friend, Dawn, and I had a chance to have long chats recalling memories and looking at where we've been for a few decades.

We both realized that when we were 18 we had great dreams, plans, and perceived needs that hadn't necessarily come to fruition. Sitting under the stars in 1988 we were pretty sure how our lives would go. Sitting in my living room in 2020 we laughed at how our lives hadn't gone in the direction we predicted. She never dreamed she would be a mother of four and I, along with many others, never had an inkling I would pursue ministry. We both agreed that we aren't disappointed. Along the way we had to let go of some things that really mattered and that we had to travel through doors that presented themselves, doors we would never have dreamed of opening.

We agreed that self-compassion had guided us through these doors and on these journey's. You see, sometimes we can be stuck on what we want outcomes to be. We believe that if it doesn't work out the way we planned we must be weak, defective, or feel anxious and fearful. We lack compassion for ourselves and accept blame which dilutes our self worth. We forget the importance of experimenting and working out what is best for ourselves versus what society tells us is best for us.

Author Paul Gilbert writes, "With all the ways of working with your thinking, remember that we're all caught up in the flow of life, like corks bouncing on the sea, and we're simply trying to do the best we can to go through life balancing our feelings and harnessing compassion." The ribbon running through all of my messages this month will be compassion. Let us listen to the messages of self-compassion, the wisdom of compassion that challenges our tendency to be self-righteous, and ways to recognize our humanity. My friend and I have practiced this over the past few days and have realized we are better for it.

## **CLIMATE ACTION TEAM NEWS**

Great news! We have been looking for a way for our All Faiths congregation to plant trees in the Dunbar neighborhood and have found a perfect location and great partners for this important environmental effort. The Apostolic House of God on Lincoln

Blvd. has welcomed us to join with their congregation to plant trees on the undeveloped property around their church. Assisting us in this effort will be a non-profit organization that specializes in tree-planting called One Tree. The Community Forum Foundation, with whom we have been working for the past few years on environmental issues in the Dunbar community, will also be involved in the project. The planting event will most likely take place in the late spring in order to take advantage of the summer rainy season. At our next CAT meeting we'll be making plans for how to raise funds for this effort and welcome any ideas you may have.

The UU Ministry for Earth has announced the March release of a documentary film they helped to produce called The Condor and the Eagle. This is an award-winning feature documentary which Ministry for Earth is calling upon UU congregations to support with special screenings to take place on or around Water Day on Sunday, March 22nd. Here's a brief summary:

Four Indigenous leaders embark on an extraordinary trans-continental adventure from the Canadian plains to deep into the heart of the Amazonian jungle to unite the peoples of North and South America and deepen the meaning of "Climate Justice". Their path through the jungle takes them on an unexpectedly challenging and liberating journey, which will forever change their attachment to the Earth and one another.

#### **TOGETHER ON THE JOURNEY**

Each month the newsletter profiles an All Faiths' veteran and/or new member. This month we feature new members, Scott Kilhefner and Anita and Robert Battaglia.



#### Scott Kilhefner Member Since 2019

Scott Kilhefner grew up in Ephrata, Pennsylvania, a small, rural town. His parents worked in finance. His dad was a bookkeeper and his mom worked for a bank. Scott has one younger sister.

After earning an education degree from Shippensburg University, he married his high school sweetheart and they moved to Virginia where Scott taught in a juvenile detention center. After his wife completed her education degree, Lee County Schools recruited her so she and Scott relocated to Fort Myers.

For 25 years, Scott taught a variety of grades and subjects in public schools. He taught special education classes in the elementary grades; history and social studies to middle school students; and reading and social studies at the high school level. He finished his high school education career as a special education caseworker. Currently, Scott is a special education teacher for the State of Florida's Department of Corrections, working at its Charlotte Correctional Institute in Punta Gorda.

Scott often relaxes at the end of a long shift by reading. His favorite book is *Lord of the Rings*, which he has read three times. He is engaged in politics and watches hockey and baseball on TV.

Scott is divorced and has three children: Micah, Divya and Olivia. You may have met Olivia; she sometimes attends services with her dad when her work schedule allows.

Divya joined the Kilhefner family about twelve years ago. Scott and his ex-wife had learned about a child in India who was considered `un-adoptable' because the little girl was too old. Divya was three at the time and couples wanted to adopt infants rather than toddlers. The Kilhefner's soon learned that an international adoption is a long, slow process that has many roadblocks. In fact, Divya was six before Scott was finally able to fly to India to bring her to the United States.

Imagine what Divya must have felt being six years old, speaking only Hindi, and never having left the orphanage where she had lived her entire life. Then a strange white man (who didn't know Hindi) arrives to take her away.

Scott said Divya was obviously stressed (as was he). A sympathetic taxi driver suggested that the three of them attend a service at a Hindu temple...something familiar to the frightened child. The priest noticed them and invited the trio to share a meal with him. During the meal, the priest talked to Divya (in Hindi). Scott could see Divya relax. Later, the taxi driver said the priest had told Divya "I have been a priest for a long time. I can see that this man (Scott) is a good man and you can trust him." Scott said although the six-day trip to India was stressful, it was a spiritual awakening for him.

Scott grew disenchanted with some of the dogma associated with the Protestant faith he had grown up in and practiced for many years. He started an on-line search for answers to questions that bothered him and eventually found references to Unitarian Universalism. He researched further, felt the UU philosophy was a good match for him, and was delighted when he found a congregation in the Fort Myers area. He first attended All Faiths on August 4, 2019, a Sunday when CJ was still on vacation. He enjoyed the service and decided to attend for a month before making any commitments. Once CJ returned to the pulpit, Scott said, "That sealed the deal." He decided to make All Faiths his spiritual home.

Scott would like to be more involved in congregational activities; however, at this time in his life, personal circumstances limit his ability to participate in many activities. But he says the hour of worship he attends each week is essential to him.



#### Anita & Robert Battaglia Member Since 2019

Retirees Anita and Robert Battaglia live in Shell Point and were friends of All Faiths members Joy Ellyn Ryan and Tim Brady. When they attended Joy Ellyn and Tim's memorial service, they were impressed by Rev. CJ's words and wondered if they

might find a spiritual home at All Faiths. Anita's religious upbringing was evangelical, but she was always discontented with the "my way is the only way" philosophy. Robert's parents were Catholic but had left the church. While he was growing up Robert attended an evangeli-

cal congregation. When they visited All Faiths, Anita said they were thrilled. "We don't want to be hypocrites and here we feel at home." They have attended regularly since their first visit and became members in October 2019.

Both Anita and Robert were raised in the Chicago area. Anita lived on the city's west side and Robert grew up in the Grange Park suburb. Anita is the eldest of four children. There was a wide age gap between her and her siblings. It's like we were raised in different families. I was almost an only child. Robert and his two siblings were part of a "100% Italian" family.

Anita graduated from Northwestern University with a degree in education and taught third through sixth grades and special education in Lincolnwood, Illinois. With the exception of a break when son Michael was small, she taught there from 1963 until she retired in 2000. Son Michael attended that same school and returned there as an adult to teach.

Robert earned a B.S. in accounting at Walton School of Commerce. He was drafted into the Army in 1960 and served two years with the First Infantry where he was assigned to transport accounting at Fort Riley, Kansas. After discharge Robert worked for several accounting firms before joining Buehler Limited in Lake Bluff, Illinois. He retired from his position as cost accounting manager in 1999.

Anita and Robert met in 1967 through one of Anita's teacher friends. Their romance progressed rapidly from dating in February, to engaged in March, and married in June. They began vacationing in Florida and purchased a home in Sable Springs following their retirement. Hurricane Irma was the trigger for them to sell their home and move to Shell Point in 2018. They are happy with the larger community and the variety of residents.

Retirement for the Battaglias has been filled with hobbies, travel, and visits to their son, daughter-in-law and two grandchildren. At Shell Point Anita enjoys gardening and belongs to a hibiscus club. She enjoys reading, cross stitching, and exercise classes. Robert describes himself as athletic, enjoying golf, bowling and basketball. He also has a personal trainer. They have travelled widely, mostly via cruise ships. They especially enjoyed a trip to Tibet where the altitude was so high there wore oxygen tanks in their hotel room!

Anita describes herself as a volunteer by nature. They are very happy with the many opportunities at All Faiths and look forward to becoming more involved in our religious community.


