The Board of Directors met on April 19, 2023, at 1:00 p.m.

After welcoming new Board Members, Barbara McFarlane, Greg Monk, Rosalie Kuehn and Secretary Diane Chernow, Marge Di-Galbo was nominated, and accepted, to serve a second term as Board Chairperson; Michelle Gemma was nominated for Vice Chair and accepted the position.

The Board Retreat held on April 7, "Dreaming Out Loud," was discussed and agreed it was a wonderful workshop and Becky Ross really presented our vision perfectly. Her notes from the day will be shared with the Congregation in the next newsletter. It was decided we should continue with Next Steps to the ideas brought out in the discussion. Our accountability in moving forward with our

dreams will be an ongoing process.

Our new AED is here. We will be scheduling CPR training for the Board and any congregants who are interested in taking the coarse. I will be setting a date with the Fort Myers Fire Department. So watch for the date if you're interested.

Alberita (Albie) Johnson has accepted the position as our new CYP Director. Albie is currently enrolled in a Lay Ministerial Program through the UUA and brings many year experience in teaching and preaching. She started on April 23, 2023. Her enthusiasm is infectious.

Lewis Robinson brought a request from Frank Geltner of the Racial Equity Team that All Faiths commit to an Ancestral Land Acknowledgment statement. Greg Monk will provide a handmade document to hang in the church. It was decided that Michelle Gemma will bring the request to the Sunday Services Committee on how we can include this in our services/order of service.

A request was received to have our events available on live stream for our members at a fee. After discussion it was decided we will trial stream certain events in May for a donation. To set up a fee for service program would be very difficult for us. It was also suggested we restart the Committee to write grant requests. This idea was put on hold until we have a minister who can lead us in this process.

The Junk-In-The-Trunk yard sale held on April 15 was a wonderful day and brought in just under \$500. We agreed to repeat this in cooler weather. The new security monitoring system is in place and operational.

The Board discussed the UUA's proposed changes to Article II, which replaces the Seven Principles. You should have received an article via email that briefly outlines the new proposal. We will have them available at services. Please review this proposal. The UUA will host three workshops on the subject on May 11, 18 or 23 at https://discuss.UUA.org/. We will present a discussion period after services on Sunday, May 7, on the proposed changes. Please join us and help us decide how All Faiths will vote on this proposal at the General Assembly in June. It affects us all. Your input is very valuable on this proposal. MINISTERIAL SEARCH UPDATE

Your Search Team remains engaged with UUA's ministerial search process. When UUA requested all congregations in search to address additional questions that become part of their profile, All Faiths' team promptly posted our answers to those questions. Per a suggestion by Christine Purcell, UUA's Transition Manager, we are revising our Congregational Profile to add more detail about All Faiths' social justice activities.

In a recent conversation, Ms. Purcell said that onethird of the 35 churches in search have not yet found a new minister. In the past, there were typically at least two ministers looking for a pulpit compared to the number of congregations in search. That is not the case this year.

One potential reason for the shortage of ministers in search is that many seminary graduates are opting to choose career paths other than parish ministry. Instead, they become chaplains or decide to serve in some other social service capacity. Also, UUA is evaluating whether relaxing its stringent requirements for a minister to be in "good standing" with the Association would encourage more seminarians to seek a parish position.

When asked whether Florida's extremely conservative political climate is a deterrent to applicants, Ms. Purcell said only two ministers had indicated they would not consider moving to Florida or Texas. On the other hand, she said some ministers welcome the challenge of serving in a community where a UU church is a haven for those with liberal ideas.

Her overall message to All Faiths: stay the course.

CLIMATE ACTION TEAM NEWS

At our April meeting the Climate Action Team discussed a new documentary by three time Academy Award winner Oliver Stone entitled *Nuclear Now* which is set to be released on May 1st in theaters across the U.S.A. We discussed how we

feel about sponsoring a screening of this film as a way to engage with Representative Byron Donalds who chairs the House Nuclear Caucus and has already introduced numerous nuclear energy bills in the House. Several CAT members acknowledged that they have long opposed nuclear energy, but are open to reconsidering what role it could play in combating climate change. No decision was made about a CAT screening of the film.

We also discussed the alarming warnings in the most recent report from the International Panel on Climate Change which asserts that we must cut greenhouse gas emissions in half by 2030 or face dire consequences. The team agreed that the time to take action is now and we need to engage with community leaders to make certain Lee County develops a community-based climate action plan. Please let us know if you have any suggestions about possible contacts in either city or county local governments.

A highlight of our April meeting was the participation of the younger generation in the person of Nova Spiller. Nova said she joined the meeting to hear about our climate change plans. She commented that we don't really have seven years to make the necessary changes and said "We really only have ninety seconds." And, of course, she is right, as anyone impacted by Hurricane Ian can painfully attest. Nova also mentioned that no one generation is responsible for the climate crisis as all generations are continuing their habits of over-consumption. CAT has long been looking for ways to engage with young people. Clearly they have a great deal to offer us.

This year CAT resumed its series of monthly film screenings and discussions. In May we will be presenting the documentary *Kiss the Ground*. This film explores how activists, scientists, farmers and politicians are turning to regenerative agriculture to save the planet's top soil and combat climate change. *Kiss the Ground*, released in 2020, is highly rated by critics and audiences alike. Look for an announcement soon of the date and time of our showing.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday, May 2nd at 1:30 p.m. on ZOOM. We hope you will be able to join us.

LEE INTERFAITH FOR EMPOWERMENT UPDATES

Thank you to all who attended LIFE's Celebration on April 25th. Past accomplishments were highlighted and community leaders who have supported past LIFE social justice efforts were applauded. Chelsea Baker Plaisance, who was LIFE's Lead Organizer for many years, was thanked for her service and Paul Leingang was welcomed as LIFE's new Lead Organizer.

For three years, LIFE urged the City of Fort Myers to establish an Affordable Housing Trust Fund which was finally established more than a year ago. Because the initial Trust Fund ordinance had some glitches, LIFE then focused on getting amendments in place that made the fund more equitable and self-sustaining. LIFE's Affordable Housing Action Team recently received a financial report from the City's Development Director, Steve Belden. Since the initial funding of \$1.5 million, the City has added additional funds from the sale of city-owned property, a 0.0821 millage rate that was passed, and other sources. As of the end of March, the fund had grown to nearly \$3.8 million! Additional monies had been deposited and the City had used the fund to help make affordable housing projects such as St. Peter Claver and Cleveland Avenue possible. The efforts of LIFE's congregations have had a positive impact on our community. Thank you to all who showed up to help with this significant win.

In late summer, LIFE's activities will begin with individual congregations holding house meetings where network members can share their thoughts about what LIFE's focus should be during its 2023-2024 cycle. Then, at an in-gathering of network members from all the LIFE congregations (the Fall Assembly), attendees will have the opportunity to vote to determine which issue LIFE should pursue. Once a specific focus has been determined, Action Teams will be formed to interview professionals and community leaders who are knowledgeable about the issue and approach other communities who have faced the same situation to learn what they did to address the matter. LIFE's Action Team will also identify local elected officials and/or community leaders who have the power to make changes to improve the lives of everyone in Lee County. Those leaders will be approached at LIFE's Spring Nehemiah Action to ask them to take a specific action that will promote social justice in Lee County.

We look forward to working with you this fall when LIFE's justice work starts again.

RACIAL EQUITY TEAM NEWS

A few months ago we spoke on "Building Beloved Community." Our racial justice equity team has been busy working to change the story from division to truth and acceptance. Building our congregational strength, and the space we share so that we can engage in helping our larger community.

We have shared the truth of man's origin and migration, over the planet, with the discussion of "Skin Deep." We discussed "Our Enduring Discontent," how our country arrived at this point of fury, how is it now that we have mass shootings even of children in their classrooms, and police killing of unarmed citizens have become a feature of our day. We spoke about mass incarceration and laws such as, "Two Strikes To Far," have led to record number of life imprisonment sentencing.

I wrote a mailbag article for *The News-Press* which encapsulated the stories in one Sunday's paper, revealing the hardships of just one day's news.

"Today's News-Press, a 'nuclear bomb' for political racism and oppression in Florida."

You can get warmed up with the front page, baseball season at Fort Myers High axed, "principal cites Title VI probe, coaching upheaval." Also, on the front page, "Listen to the last ride podcast Ep. 4 'the polygraph."

In The Views, there are many, but let us just highlight two of the bombshells, "Bill would victimize immigrants for political theater," and "Elected officials refuse to actively engaged in gun violence solutions." There are many more in The Views, and scattered throughout the paper. There is enough there to stimulate the mind even of the doubters.

The Title VI probe is just the surfacing of our long school segregated school issue. No, it isn't just CRT it's about minority students getting an equal opportunity education, and about coaching staffs using racial slurs.

Victimizing immigrants for political theater is a lot more than it seems also. Examine what's really happening victimizing immigrants, and their families at the border even to the point of exposing them to violence and institutional trauma, for example, danger in case of fires, but refusing to allow aid by communities. I think this is criminal. Then you add to the problem of at the same time, offering immigrants community a carrot to vote for them (whitening). This not only victimizes immigrants, but victimizes the entire nation I hope that our congregation's commitment to building a beloved community can extend to building a multiracial,

multicultural, congregation and strengthening of our general community. A commitment that will lead to dismantling Racism, Sexism, Classism and other isms. There are many problems waiting for a group effort to solve.

With the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act, we have the opportunity to eliminate water, air and land pollution. We had the opportunity to create massive, clean energy, carbon free. Florida has a massive number of lead pipes carrying drinking water to residences and our residents are unaware of what they are drinking. We have answers and we have a job to do.

FOR THE HOMELESS NEWS

This team continues to meet on the third Thursday of the month at 1:00 p.m. It is a time to discuss issues around people losing, needing, and finding stable housing.

For a change, we will meet at the First Watch restaurant 2059 Altamount Ave., north of All Faiths in the 1st Street Village, May 18, at 11:30 a.m. Please join us!

The bicycle collection receives 1-2 bikes a week from All Faiths neighbors. A big thanks to Dan De-Shon who brings them to All Souls church in North Fort Myers where they are repaired and distributed to people accessing services through their homeless outreach program.

In March, Pam Pfalzer and Judy Alberda purchased 50 Emergency Mylar Blankets, 120 rain ponchos, 96 waterproof mosquito repellent bracelets, and repellent wipes with money from our social justice fund. These were donated to Matt Wallace's team doing street outreach.

We have plans to contact LIFE congregations in order to learn about their ministries to people without housing. Tina Noel will lead that outreach.

This fall we will again ask the congregation to donate hygiene products, socks, and clean sleeping bags. Susan Meissner continues knitting hats that will be donated to Lee County Homeless Outreach Team.

Revenue/Operating Income and Expenses:

No unusual expenses were incurred. Budget control was good throughout the 2022-2023 fiscal year. There were no minister related expenses from September through March.

Our Pledge Goal through March was \$209,973.00; and \$172,561.78 was received. Most of the recent pledge giving was for the current year (2022-2023): but \$22,600 was for the next year (2023-2024). This "overlap" in pledge giving occurs at the end of each fiscal year, when our Stewardship pledge drive is underway. Your continued generosity to meet our financial obligations is appreciated.

Since Hurricane Ian, with available funds from the UUA and our insurance carrier, the roof and gutters have been replaced. Interior renovations will be done when contractors are available and acceptable quotes are received. Funds for this work are deposited in the Capital Checking Account. This is why there is such a large balance in the Capital Checking Account.

The resurfacing of the parking lot is in the process of being scheduled and work should commence shortly.

The monthly transfer/deposit of \$1,150 to the Capital Reserve account was made. The replacement AED/defibrillator has finally been received (at an additional cost of \$250 because the original model was no longer available).

In March, \$324.25 was collected for Operation Joy.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT

On behalf of the Finance Committee, I am thanking you for your continued financial support. During the past fiscal year which ended March 31, 2023, we were able to cover our operating expenses. Our Operating Income was 80.5% of the budget, while our Operating Expenses were 77.2% of the budget. Our expenses were low because we did not have any minister's compensation and expenses for seven months of the year. Our Board and Staff members were diligent in keeping costs down wherever possible.

We received funds from our wind and flood insurance to cover costs for a new roof and other repairs necessitated by the hurricane.

The past three years have been challenging due to COVID pandemic, and then the massive losses and displacements caused by Hurricane Ian. We know that had an impact on the capability of some of our people to make contributions. And some members died or moved away to be closer to family.

We are optimistic that many of you will be able to increase your regular giving so that we can hire and compensate a new minister to lead and inspire us in the coming year.

We at All Faiths are truly blessed to have such a vibrant and loving family.

CHILD & YOUTH PROGRAM NOTES

Spring/Summer 2023 Theme: Miracles

Every day we are engaged in a miracle which we don't even recognize: a blue sky, white clouds, green leaves, the black, curious eyes of a child—our own two eyes. "All is a miracle." — Thich Nhat Hanh

The exploration of miracles has no limits, through the rest of spring till our summer break our children and youth program will explore Miracles in all their awe and wonder.

May 7: We continue our exploration of miracles by cultivating our ability to Notice the Miraculous. Our youth will discover that "looking with absolute attention," a teaching of poet and novelist May Sarton (1912-1995), can bring them in touch with their own capacity for "direct experience of mystery and wonder."

May 14: Miracles continue with Transformation by exploring a folk tale from Korea, "The Snake Husband," that highlights the mystery of transformation and prompts discussion about the natural changes all life forms undergo. We will consider whether and how there is miracle in human birth, life, and death.

May 28: Serendipity and Miracles, Unitarian Universalists affirm the compatibility of religion and science today, our religious forebears celebrated both faith and reason. In Unitarian Universalism, critical questioning can be a religious experience; This session looks at Priestley, known for serendipitous scientific discoveries, because sometimes a miracle appears while we are searching for something else.

And coming up...

June 4: The Miracles of Self- transformation, we will explore inner, human transformations—changes of heart. We will identify inner changes so deep, complete, and meaningful to the self and to others that they can seem miraculous. And explore how such changes happen: What moves a person from greed to generosity? Indifference to caring?

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
