Greetings All Faiths Unitarians and Universalists.

We have one more month of Summer, well, not really! In Fort Myers, we have several more months of summer weather this year. Happy Summer!

In June I experienced the Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly (GA) in person for the first time. I have attended four; the first three were online. But in my opinion, nothing takes the place of being in person. I was pleasantly surprised to find that most of the presenters were people that I have worked with in the past. In fact, my mentor, the Rev. John Crestwell, and his congregation the UU Annapolis have gained more than 250 new members in the last year. He also serves on the Board of the Interfaith Alliance of Southwest Florida, of which I am a member. Rev. Tony and I will be sharing each other's pulpits sometime in the Fall or early winter.

There were many opportuni-

ties for networking, shopping and growth at GA. Most of my time was spent attending the General Sessions, and voting as a Delegate. I thoroughly enjoyed it, look forward to going next year, and am filled with appreciation for All Faiths funding the registration fees. You all are the best!

I look forward to presenting a panel discussion at All Faiths to share in greater detail the experiences and events of the General Assembly in the near future, along with David Donovan and Carole Latino who were also at GA.

As I write this article for the newsletter, I am packing my bags for a 3-week vacation to Italy. I need a vacation from my retirement. LOL!! I have been your Board Chair now for about 4 months and have been very busy at work for the Congregation. Since there was no Board meeting in July, I will share with you some thoughts I have about other things.

#### **Social Justice:**

I am proud of the Social Justice outreach actions our Congregation does in the community. This is what distinguishes us from other organizations. We express this in many ways at All Faiths, but I believe that having a more visible presence in the community is important as well. It is when we gather in public, wearing our T-Shirts, that people see who we are and what we stand for. This also helps build new partnerships and grow connections which can lead to new members and help us grow our community.

We all know that food insecurity is a major issue in SWFL. It has been suggested that maybe All Faiths could get more involved in feeding the hungry. This could be as simple as someone just organizing outreach efforts supporting other organizations like Community Cooperative Soup Kitchen, increasing our presence at St Mathew's House, conducting more food drives etc. If you are interested, please let me know.

In August, I am planning an event at All Faiths in support of the Community Cooperative Soup Kitchen's summer project called "Hungry Hungry Kiddo Kits". The idea is to collect snack items like breakfast bars, fruit cups, cereal cups, PB&J and grab-n-go snacks and then assemble them into kits using paper bags that we can decorate. The Soup Kitchen will deliver them to needy children in the local area. I think this will be a fun event held at All Faiths to put the kits together. Watch the bulletin board for more info.

#### **Congregational Teams**

I will be working with our Justice Teams in the near future to introduce two new UUA programs to see if we want to implement them here at All Faiths. There are training classes that can be taken to get ready.

- 1. Green Sanctuary 2030. The UUA has updated the old Green Sanctuary program to make it a more simplified process to achieve, and it will be self-certified.
- 2. Mosaic Congregation Program. This is the UUA's effort to widen the circle of concern to include a more multicultural program. It will be similar to the Welcoming Congregation for the LGBTQ community, but instead will emphasize lifespan learning in diversity, equity and inclusion and anti-oppression.

I want to give a huge shoutout to the members of All Faiths Congregation. The support that you have shown to the Rainbow Connection has had a significant impact on our lives and made our Pride celebrations this year very successful. We had fun and enjoyed won-

derful services, celebrations of diversity and a very successful Naples Pride, despite the threat of major protests this year. Thank you for all the love and support.

Volunteers for the Membership Team stepped up and have gone outside the box to be present in the community by hosting an All Faiths booth at the last two monthly community events called Wednesday Night Market at the Alliance for the Arts. Thank you for getting our message out into the community and working to invite guests to visit our Congregation.

Are you looking for some FUN?? Please ask me about the upcoming All Faiths Fall Festival scheduled for Saturday October 25th. The plan is to host a 9-hole mini golf game (designed by me) on the front lawn and serve hot dogs and hamburgers etc. This will be a fun event and is intended to be an open invitation in hopes of getting local neighbors of all ages to join in. The plan to make this an annual event and become an outreach effort to attract more families to the Congregation.

#### **General Assembly:**

I want to express gratitude to all the people that supported my journey to the UUA General Assembly. I would not have experienced this without your love and support. I attended many events and found them very enlightening. I learned a lot about our denomination, their programs and inner workings. This will be a topic for a future talk.

#### **Building Improvements:**

I want to let the Congregation know about the many facility improvements that the Board is working on or has already completed this year. Here are some of those items:

- 1. Upgraded the sound system (new board, microphones & rechargeable batteries)
- 2. Planted new native bushes and shrubs at the front of the building and gardens
- 3. Rerouted the existing unused irrigation system to just water the garden areas
- 4. Purchased two new Tables and an Umbrella to make better use of the patio area
- 5. Purchased a new computer for Regina
- 6. Approved the purchase of new office furniture for both Albie and Regina
- 7. Approved the painting of the outside of the building as well as Albie's office walls
- 8. Purchased sidewalk feather banners to increase our presence in the community

As you may know, over the years, the Board has been looking at ways to expand the building to be more useful and able to support a larger congregation. Due to significant cost implications required by the city if we expand the footprint of the building, we have agreed to investigate a more scaleddown version as follows:

1. Expand the current vestibule/entryway. This will allow more room to accommodate incoming guests in a short time frame, while also welcoming

- 2. Add a soundproof wall further back from the Sanctuary that would allow us to have a larger space to accommodate a meeting room as well as hosting the children's education during service. This wall could include either center doors or be expandable to open up for larger events.
  - 3. Possibly add new carpeting/flooring throughout.

The Board has contracted with an architect to develop a design that can be submitted for contractor quotations. We do not have, nor can we estimate the cost for this expansion without first getting a design completed. No commitments have been made, but the cost of the design. When there is more to communicate, I will certainly let you all know. As you can see, the Board has been very busy, and I thought it was important to give everyone an update on the things we have been working on and where they stand today.

#### **RAINBOW CONNECTION NEWS**

This past month has been very busy for the Rainbow Connection Team, and we are very proud of the representation shown by All Faiths members in their support of our work. Here are a few of our accomplishments this past month:

- On June 8th, we held a Worship service honoring the memory our Trans and Drag brothers and sisters who started a revolution at the Stonewall Inn on June 28, 1969.
- We held a POSE Dance party after service on June 8th, where everyone dressed up to honor the lives depicted in the mini-series POSE, where Queer and Trans people in the Black and Latino community banded together to form families called Houses. This was to help each other and form their own families because they were kicked to the side or abandoned by their own parents and society. During the 70's & 80's, in large cities around the country, dance competitions were held between these Houses, where they competed for trophies. This was known as the "Black Ball culture" and is portrayed in the mini-series POSE with Billy Porter.
- We conducted a candle lighting and reflection to remember and honor the 49 young lives lost at the Pulse nightclub shooting in Orlando on June 12, 2016.
- We hosted a very successful booth at Naples Pride again this year. It was well attended despite the threat of large protests. Unfortunately, the Drag shows had to be moved inside due to court intervention. We even got visitors from the event to our services the next day.
- We just need two Days of Observances to complete our renewal of the Welcoming Congregation program for 2025. These will be held in October.

The Rainbow Connection team has big plans for the 2nd half of 2025. We are in the planning phases for several fundraisers and are working to enter a Float in next year's Cape Coral Pride parade. We need decoration ideas and helpers when the time comes.

I encourage anyone interested in helping or joining the Rainbow Connection team to come to a meeting or see David or Carole. Our next meeting is scheduled for August 10th. Please let one of us know if you might be interested.

#### **Revenue/Operating Income and Expenses:**

As we entered the new 2025-2026 fiscal year on April 1, All Faiths budgeted \$202,086 for pledge giving; to date, actual Not Alone pledges totaled \$185,160 (86.9%).

In June, we received \$10,182 in pledge giving towards our Not Alone Pledge Drive. And in the fiscal year that just ended, \$28,413 was received for the Not Alone pledge drive.

Year to date (since April 1), our pledge giving has totaled \$38,356.95, while we budgeted \$50,526 (75.9%).

No unusual expenses were incurred in the General Fund Operating Account during June.

June's Interest Income was \$460.46.

At the beginning of the 2023-2024 fiscal year, several new accounts were created at Live Oak to generate increased interest income. The 1 Year CD rate is 4.1%. And the Savings rate is currently at 3.35%.

The June monthly transfer/deposit of \$1,640.00 to the Live Oak Capital Reserve account was made. A new computer for Regina was purchased at a cost of \$1,080. And painting the building' exterior and Albie's office was authorized; this work was completed for July.

In June, \$455 was collected for Cape Coral Pride (Rainbow Connection Team).

# SIDE WITH LOVE DENOUNCES UNDERMINING OF JOHNSON AMENDMENT

**Side With Love** Affirms Commitment to Separation of Church and State

The IRS recently made news by suggesting that clergy be allowed to endorse political candidates to their churches. While this potential change surfaced as part of a lawsuit the IRS is involved in, no changes to IRS policies or the laws governing political activity for nonprofits have been finalized or fully enacted.

For years, the UUA has published guidance to our congregations and leaders about how to be a prophetic voice advocating for UU values in the public square. Additionally, our faith has a long history of faithful statements and resolutions that unequivocally support the separation of church and state. As such, we are deeply concerned by the IRS's actions which would further erode this fundamental principle and democracy itself. The UUA maintains adherence to this principle and calls on all people of faith and conscience to uphold this cornerstone of democracy. This serves both to safeguard the public pluralism of religious freedom and civil rights from government interference, and to preserve the independence of religious organizations, allowing us to follow our calling without entanglement from the state. Both are more important now than ever in pushing back against the rising tide of authoritarianism and the infiltration of white Christian nationalism into government and public policy.

We offer a plethora of resources supporting congregations in being "Prophetic, Not Partisan," including "The Real Rules" -- a handy guidebook on appropriate political activity and justice organizing. This guidance is woven into all of our nonpartisan, pro-democracy work through UU the Vote. These recommendations remain the UUA's best guidance on navigating IRS rules and current law governing non-profits, including congregations.

In the weeks and months ahead, we will continue to monitor the potential impact of any changes to nonprofit laws. In a time when UUs are under heightened scrutiny from hostile governmental leaders, we are particularly conscious that there are many who would seek any avenue to question our legitimacy and standing. Our guidance remains the same as it has always been to protect our essential position in our communities: partisan activity is incompatible with an organization's 501(c)3 status, including for us as churches, while it remains our moral duty to advocate publicly and unapologetically for laws and policies that align with our shared UU values.
