The Board of Directors met on March 15, 2023, at 1:00 p.m.

After welcoming future incoming Secretary, Diane Chernow, and Barbara Mc-Farlane, the Board was informed of the resignation of CYP Director Kathy Fanny effective March 10, 2023. Rachel Spiller has volunteered to manage the Child & Youth Program until a new director is hired. We will begin placing advertisements and interviewing for the position.

John Conrad proposed transferring some of All Faiths funds to other institutions, including Lake Michigan Credit Union, that have higher interest rates. The Board voted to move forward with Hallmark resurfacing our existing parking lot. The cost will be \$24,840. Waiting any longer will only increase the cost as building materials prices are continuing to rise. We also agreed to update our Security System for \$1,200.

Carpet cleaning is scheduled for March 28. Frank Geltner generously donated a \$250 gift certificate for this purpose; we are grateful.

Chris Stotler would like to develop a way to recognize members who commit to leaving All Faiths a Legacy. This will need further discussion and planning. If anyone is interested in working on this or has any ideas please discuss with Chris.

Citizens Wind Insurance has renewed our policy for 2023 for \$5,059, a 27% increase.

After discussion about safety it was decided that the Board felt comfortable purchasing a new Black Lives Matter flag to fly out front with the Rainbow flag.

Lewis Robinson discussed ongoing concerns about the

Racial Justice Team. He is looking for people to participate with managing the team. Please see Lewis if you can provide assistance.

Our beautiful new street sign is in place and awaiting the lights to be reinstalled.

Fundraising is going to require additional assistance in the coming year to help make up for the budget shortfall. We need people to participate in the Junk-inthe-Trunk event on April 15. Please sign up to work with John Conrad on this event. We welcome any fundraising ideas you may have.

We did raise over \$1,000 with the presentation of Bible Bad Girls. This was a fun and informative show. We had a great turnout of over 60 people.

The Tamiami Tale Tellers, a longtime SWFL storytelling guild, has requested to use our building one day a month for their meetings, which are open to the public. The Board approved this request. It will be good for community relations.

A Board Retreat will take place on April 7. Traditionally, this is where the outgoing board welcomes the incoming board and brings them up to date on the business of the congregation. We will say thank you to retiring board members Rachel Spiller, Ed Elrod, Peter Erickson and Judy Alberda. and welcome new members Diane Chernow, Secretary, Rosalie Kuehn, Barbara McFarlane and Greg Monk. The next Board Chair Person and Vice Chairperson will be elected.

The next board meeting will be April 19, at which time a Board Chair and Vice Chair will be elected by the board members.

If time permits, a longer story is OK or a teller may share more than one story.

CLIMATE ACTION TEAM NEWS

On April 22nd, people around the planet will celebrate EARTH DAY. Here at All Faiths, your Climate Action Team kicked off that celebration on March 22nd, World Water Day, with a screening of the Leonardo DiCaprio film Before the Flood. Following the screening we discussed the fact that in the intervening years since the film was produced in 2015 the world's response to the climate crisis has been woefully inadequate. Clearly, not enough has been done to realize the United Nations Paris Agreement goal of limiting warming this century to 1.5 degrees The recently released IPCC (Intergovern-Centigrade. mental Panel on Climate Change) report indicates the probability that we will reach that level of warming in the early 2030's. The three young children who attended the Before the Flood screening challenged us to find ways to do more. For the sake of future generations, that is a challenge we must all embrace.

This month we invite you all to join us at 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 18th for a screening of *Current Revolution*. This is a series of short films from the American Resilience Project which explores the transition from fossil fuels to renewables with a focus on national security, economic prosperity, and environmental justice. Perhaps nowhere is it more evident than in the Florida legislature that it will indeed take a revolution to accomplish this essential transition here in the Sunshine State. We urge you to join us in exploring the climate challenges facing us and how we can best respond to them both individually and as a congregation.

The Climate Action Team will meet on Zoom at 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday, April 4th. Our meetings are open to all who wish to attend. We hope you will be able to join us as we discuss our plans for EARTH DAY and beyond.

LEE INTERFAITH FOR EMPOWERMENT UPDATES

All Faiths was well-represented at LIFE's February Love In Action event. Feedback from the event was positive...especially the discussion time when All Faiths network members had the opportunity to talk with attendees from other congregations. LIFE's new Lead Organizer, Paul Leingang, was introduced. He will replace Chelsea Plaisance as Chelsea moves to a new phase of her career.

LIFE's next large gathering will be April 25th, where network members can learn about and celebrate the achievements LIFE has attained in the last 12 years. This year's event will be held at Unity of Fort Myers, 11120 Ranchette Road, and will begin at 6:30 pm. Besides learning about LIFE's many accomplishments, network members' injustice concerns will be identified as LIFE prepares to identify a focus for its 2023-24 actions. That focus will be decided at LIFE's Fall Assembly.

This is the time of year when network members are encouraged to invest (aka donate) to ensure LIFE can continue to work toward creating a more just community for all Lee County citizens. The suggested investment is \$200 per network member, but any amount will be welcomed and put to good use. The LIFE Board has instituted policies and procedures that will prevent a recurrence of the embezzlement they discovered this past year. (The perpetrator is no longer a bookkeeper for LIFE and is being investigated by the Lee County Sheriff's Department as well as the FBI for his fraudulent actions against LIFE and 14 other entities.) LIFE's new policies require two signatures on every check; signatories are subjected to a background check; the Treasurer and LIFE employees are not allowed to sign checks; and the Board reviews the bank statement and reconciliation statement every month. You can be assured that your donation will be safe-guarded and will be used to fight injustice.



Did you know that rabbits are the third most surrendered animal, right after cats and dogs? Revenue/Operating Income and Expenses:

Budget control was good with 82% of our budget over the first 11 months being expensed (considering the monthly transfers to Capital Reserves). There were no minister-related expenses from September through February.

Our Pledge Goal through February was \$192,475; and \$160,310 was received. Most of the recent pledge giving was for the current year (2022-2023): but \$22,600 was for the next year (2023-2024). This "overlap" in pledge giving occurs at the end of each fiscal year when our Stewardship pledge drive is underway. Your continued generosity to meet our financial obligations is appreciated.

Our annual insurance premiums were paid totaling \$11,416.

\$6,000 previously "borrowed" from the Operating Reserve Account was returned in February.

Since Hurricane lan, with available funds from the UUA and our insurance carrier, the roof and gutters have been replaced. Interior renovations will be done when contractors are available and acceptable quotes are received. Funds for this work are deposited in the Capital Checking Fund. This is why there is such a large balance in the Capital Checking Fund.

The AED/defibrillator ordered last November, cannot be delivered by the manufacturer, an upgraded AED was purchased at an additional cost of \$250; And a new BBQ grill was purchased for cookouts.

In February, \$1,110 was collected for the Minister's Discretionary Fund.

RACIAL EQUITY TEAM NEWS

We are about six months post hurricane IAN'S destruction in our communities. I am sure all of the marginalized communities had significant damage in some areas but we are recovering.

In addition, these communities are in a chronic state of environmental injustice. There is always the problem of air pollution, and poor quality water. We established that several years ago in our environmental study in Dunbar. Since that study, environmental legislation has been passed to remove and replace old municipal water line and provide some in-home removal of lead pipes. However, I know of no such work ever being done in Lee County. Just a few days ago, there was on Facebook a posting of a member with a very poor quality water sample displayed on the post. So, despite the cities receiving grants to repair leaky sewage plant spill into Billys creek and others areas we still have that problem.

Each day, now that I am displaced from my usual residence, I walk along, McGregor Boulevard and Iona Road for some distance. Unfortunately, this is usually in morning rush-hour and traffic is very heavy. I haven't had to do this since I practiced and lived in city, and often time did not permit me to find a better place to run. This is not healthy, and certainly not enjoyable. Yet most of our inner city residents, particularly economically stressed reside in an area, which is bound by two or more heavily congested roadways. That seems to be the way we construct our cities. So, although we are not on McGregor Boulevard during usual rush hour traffic, our neighbors are and people who use McGregor Boulevard for recreation or commuting are. I also travel daily on route 41 (Cleveland Ave), and parts of Gladiolus and Summerlin Boulevard. I think most of us live out of these Corridors, but it doesn't mean we should not be concerned.

An additional problem which is very concerning is that Habitat for Humanity gets its source of land to build on usually in compromised areas. For example, in Lee County's Harlem Heights area there will be continued building and rebuilding in a flood Zone. The county perhaps has a plan for that, but I do not know.

I will address this in the racial justice equity meetings, and I hope the congregation understands what is being communicated. Thank you very much.

UUA RESPONDS TO GROWING LEGISLATIVE ATTACKS AGAINST TRANS AND NONBINARY+ KIDS AND THE LGBTQIA+ COMMUNITY

These are heartbreaking times. They are also defining times. An onslaught of oppressive laws and policies are threatening the lives and well-being of our children, young people and adults, our families, and the very fabric of communities.

We affirm and remain in solidarity with trans and nonbinary+ people because this is a fight for everyone's humanity.

We are experiencing the outright political targeting of transgender and nonbinary+ children and adults, including the banning of gender affirming healthcare, bans against trans kids playing sports, and laws criminalizing drag. This policy violence and dehumanizing rhetoric creates an environment that can provoke physical violence and further discrimination. We are also witnessing efforts to criminalize reproductive healthcare, comprehensive education about race, Black history, and gender, and numerous issues of human rights that are spreading across countless states nationally. These attacks cut right to the heart of our fundamental religious belief in the inherent worth and dignity of each person, a fundamental right of conscience, and the values of personal agency that give us all the opportunity to live fully into our whole selves.

These issues of censoring education and the targeting of LGBTQIA+ communities and communities of color are not unrelated. They are intended to divide and make neighbor afraid of neighbor. They coincide with efforts to dismantle democracy and individual agency, all by pushing authoritarian policies that violate the sanctity of our homes, our bodies, and our diverse religious beliefs. As progressive people of faith, we recognize the forces feeding these far-right efforts. Throughout history, we've seen these tactics and ideology before and it always leads to destruction and violence.

However, Unitarian Universalism teaches a different way. We know we must create communities where all feel safe and all belong. Our faith calls us to show up powerfully - both pastorally, providing support and aid to our people and neighbors, and prophetically, with committed organizing and bold moral courage.

We are clear and unapologetic. Our LGBTQIA+ siblings are sacred, whole, and divine. As Unitarian Universalists, we understand that the full expression of the diversity of gender and sexuality is a gift. Our commitment to love and justice, to inclusive ministry and prophetic action, is deep and lifeaffirming. We actively organize to promote the leadership of Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC) communities. We work to end anti-Black racism, organize for racial justice, disability justice, gender justice, LGBTQIA+ equality, and support reproductive justice, climate justice and more.

Our hearts are with everyone in these frontline communities and states. Every day, we see a new regressive policy idea being introduced or debated. We pray especially for all our trans and nonbinary+ kids and their families and the communities supporting them. Trans and nonbinary+ people are living in an environment where legislators and policy makers are criminalizing their very existence. Trans children and their parents fear that the state will prevent them from receiving appropriate healthcare or from feeling secure in their families. It is forcing many people to consider relocating for their own safety and that of their families.

As progressive people of faith, we affirm and remain in solidarity with trans and nonbinary+ people because this is a fight for everyone's humanity. We must actively work to create a society where trans children can be free to be who they are and fully live into their identity. And we must strengthen our partnerships across faith communities and with grassroots partners to build networks of safety and care while mobilizing for change that supports a more just, equal, and loving society.

Progress is not always constant or straightforward - and we will not succeed in opposing every bill targeted at our people and children. But we can find inspiration from our own Rev. Theodore Parker, who said in his sermon, "Of Justice and the Conscience" (PDF 11 pages), "I do not pretend to understand the moral universe, the arc is a long one, my eye reaches but little ways...But from what I see I am sure it bends towards justice."

UPLIFT also sponsors monthly gatherings for trans and nonbinary+ people of all ages and we welcome any trans and nonbinary+ individuals in need of support and community to attend. Additionally, in the past year, we have spoken out unequivocally against anti-trans policies in Texas and Alabama and have supported legal actions challenging these dehumanizing laws.

We know that more must be done in our communities, congregations, and within the association itself to protect vulnerable people. We know that more is being asked of us - and more is needed from all of us to respond to this moment with clarity, compassion, and courage. And we know that we have the tools to create safe harbors, to continue to educate our children and communities about the full expression of human sexuality and gender, and the skills to organize to defend our values, our people, and the right of all people to be free and thrive.

We cannot do it alone. As UUs, we understand that we are part of the interdependent web of all creation. We belong to each other and this knowledge fuels our faithful commitment to unwaveringly fight for justice; to unwaveringly fight for each other.
