DESTINATION JOY by Alberita Johnson, CL Minister



The last time Christmas Eve was on a Sunday was the year 2017, or six years ago. That was not long, and yet I find it difficult to remember that particular day...Dec. 24, 2017.

Although it was not long ago, so much has occurred since then that it seems like eons instead of a few years.

There were major events in those years that caused a marked shift in our politics and country, and that was the election of Donald Trump as the 45th President of the United States six years ago. What appeared to be a ripple in our politics has grown into a raging storm of what I consider weird.

Here is a brief rundown of events that occurred during the last six years through April 2023.

2023-

• March, April 2023 – Former president Donald Trump is indicted and arraigned. He pleads not guilty on 34 counts of falsifying business records.

2022-

• Hurricane Ian was a deadly and extremely destructive Category 5 Atlantic hurricane, which was the third-costliest weather disaster on record, the deadliest hurricane to strike the state of Florida since the 1935 Labor Day hurricane, and the strongest hurricane to make landfall in Florida since Michael in 2018. It peaked as a Category 5 hurricane with sustained winds of 160 mph (260 km/h) early on September 28, while progressing towards the west coast of Florida, and made landfall just below peak intensity in Southwest Florida on Cayo Costa Island. In doing so, Ian tied with several other storms to become the 5th-strongest hurricane on record to make landfall in the contiguous U.S.

• June 24, 2022 – Roe v. Wade is overturned by the Supreme Court.

2021-

• June 17, 2021 – Juneteenth National Independence Day Act is passed, making Juneteenth a federal holiday

• January 20, 2021 – Kamala Harris becomes the 49th vice president and the first woman to hold her office

January 13, 2021 – Trump becomes the only president to be impeached for a second time. Ten Republicans join all Senate Democrats in voting to impeach Trump

January 6, 2021 – Trump-supporting rioters storm the United States Capitol, forcing Congress to evacuate and interrupting the Electoral College vote count that certified Joe Biden's victory. 2020-

• December 14, 2020 – The first doses of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine are given out in the United States.

• September 18, 2020 – Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg dies

• May 25, 2020 – George Floyd, an African-American man living in Minneapolis, is murdered by Derek Chauvin, who kneeled on his neck during an arrest. Subsequently, nationwide protests ensued

• April 27, 2020 – The US Pentagon releases three UFO videos

• April 11, 2020 – The U.S. becomes the country with the highest number of reported COVID-19 deaths: over 20,000, overtaking Italy

• March 16, 2020 – The Dow Jones falls by -2,997.10, the single largest point drop in history and the second largest percentage drop ever at -12.93%, a larger crash than the Wall Street Crash of 1929. Most schools are also closed by this date.

• January 21, 2020 – The first patient in the United States is diagnosed with coronavirus.

2019-

• December 18, 2019 – The U.S. House of Representatives impeaches President Trump for high crimes and misdemeanors

• April 2019 – The first image of a black hole is taken

• April 4, 2019 – The 1973 War Powers Act Resolution is invoked for the first time when the House of Representatives votes 247–175 to end U.S. military assistance in Saudi Arabia in its intervention in the Yemeni Civil War.

• 2019 – The Supreme Court case <u>Bucklew v. Precythe</u> rules 5 to 4 that inmates on death row are not guaranteed "painless executions" under the Constitution.

• 2019 – All the works published in 1923 except for sound recordings (2022 scheduled events) enter the public domain in the United States

2018-

• 2018 – The entire West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals is impeached

2017-

• 2017 – Film producer Harvey Weinstein is accused of sexual harassment in a New York Times expose, marking the beginning of the Me Too movement.

• 2017 – Hurricane Harvey makes landfall in the United States, flooding broad swaths of Texas and Louisiana and causing tens of billions of dollars of damage, making it one of the costliest natural disasters in U.S. history.

• 2017 – Hurricane Irma makes landfall in Florida and causes tens of billions of dollars of damage. Irma also wrecks the Caribbean Islands.

• 2017 – Hurricane Maria made landfall on Puerto Rico as a Category 5 hurricane, killing hundreds and knocking out the island's power.

• 2017 – A white supremacist rally in Charlottesville, Virginia leads to three deaths and to the discussion about racism in modern American society. The term alt-right receives renewed popular consciousness.

• 2017 – Donald Trump becomes the 45th president, Mike Pence becomes the 48th vice president. Trump is the first person without prior military or government service to hold the office.

Clearly much has occurred within the last six years in this country that are notable. What I did not include in my list are the numerous shootings particularly mass shootings that happened in that same period of time. It was too much to bear.

As we draw closer to the new year, I am optimistic and reminded to take comfort in nature as she is a testament to the power and fortitude of life. Nature does not remain dormant, instead changes often as we all do, even our institutions. No one knows what we will encounter in the future; however, I encourage you, as we near 2024, to remember these relevant words from the Rev. TD Jakes, "Never make a permanent decision based on a temporary storm. No matter how raging the billows are today, remind yourself." "this too shall pass." These four words are a Persian adage that has been translated and used in several languages. It reflects on the temporary nature, or ephemerality, of the human condition — that neither the bad, nor good, moments in life ever indefinitely last.

CLIMATE ACTION TEAM NEWS

All eyes will be on Dubai, United Arab Emirates this December as the nations of the world gather at COP 28 to seek solutions to the climate crisis threatening life on our planet. Beginning on November 30 and running until December 12th, the conference will cover a broad range of topics. In a letter to parties dated July 2023, the Incoming Presidency announced that COP 28 will focus on four paradigm shifts:

• Fast-tracking the energy transition and slashing emissions before 2030;

• Transforming climate finance, by delivering on old promises and setting the framework for a new deal on finance:

• Putting nature, people, lives, and livelihoods at the heart of climate action; and

• Mobilizing for the most inclusive COP ever.

Much has been written about the choice of Sultan Al-Jabar, head of the Abu Dahbi National Oil Company, as the leader of COP 28. Is this a case of the fox guarding the hen house? Or will he prove to be more effective because of his insider knowledge and perspective? Your Climate Action Team will obviously be watching carefully to understand what is (and isn't) being accomplished at this vital event.

Closer to home, we encourage you to mark your calendars to attend the RESET Seed and Plant Festival at UUCFM on Saturday, December 9th from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Those of you who attended last year's Festival know what a delightful way this is to enjoy a beautiful December day in Fort Myers, FL.

The December Climate Action Team meeting has been scheduled for December 12th at 1:30 p.m. on Zoom. We invite you to join us to learn more about our activities and our engagement with other environmental groups here in Southwest Florida. Wishing you all a happy holiday season.

Homelessness in seniors is a very complex issue. There is a real danger for unhoused seniors living on the street. Accidents or crime can happen frequently, and their ability to get services or adequate help is often unavailable. When you view unhoused

seniors, first consider their safety. Medical health issues are often present, because they may be without healthcare and essential medicines. Financial problems are often prominent, caused by decreased, unavailable or unaffordable healthcare.

Florida did not accept Medicaid expansion, while the Federal Government did enroll more Medicaid patients. Now that many states are trimming their Medicaid rosters, we can expect to see this problem for seniors increase. Poverty is a major factor, caused by low income while working, and inadequate retirement savings. There is a high correlation between household income and life expectancy. The population of seniors over the age of 80 is rising, while overall life expectancy is decreasing.

The gold standard for senior care is (CCRC) Community Care Retirement Community. However, most seniors are not able to afford this. The cost is rising rapidly, and the cost of long-term care insurance is becoming unaffordable. All of these factors combine to accentuate the long-term care problem.

We can add the inability to find adequate staffing of people to care for the elderly. Nursing homes (Oreos) are primary beneficiaries of the Medicaid program, but they compete for staffing, even though they have less ability to pay.

Seniors often depend on family and close friends for care. When facing financial difficulties, the seniors' homes (primary residences) become sacrificed. This creates a major burden for families.

Our Heart for the Homeless Team hopes to function to make lives better, but we realize that this is a major institutional problem. The State and Federal Governments should be major providers. We must actively solicit these institutions to do their jobs.

The Racial Equity Team is very intent on doing the necessary work to achieve the knowledge needed to do the "outside" work. We are trying hard to change our mindset in order to create change in our beloved community. We have made significant progress. One day soon we hope to share with the Congregation. Will the Congregation be interested? Ready?
