BOARD NOTES by Marge DiGalbo, Board Chair

The Board meeting was held on Wednesday, March 20, 2024.

As our fiscal year is coming to a close and our Pledge Campaign is completed. The Board reviewed and approved the Finance Committee's recommendations to consolidate some of our accounts as presented by Treasurer John Conrad. This will streamline the accounts and increase our interest.

All Faiths received an invitation to attend a Faith Based Assistance for Emergency in the Community program in May. The Board agreed All Faiths should participate in this program and will send interested members to the May 2, 2024 training.

The Board accepted the proposal from the Racial Equity Team that All Faiths adopt an 8th Principle. We agreed on the language as follows: "We, the members of All Faiths Unitarian Congregation, covenant to build a multicultural Beloved Community, free of racism and other oppressions, by making inclusion a part of our spiritual journey." This was presented at the Annual Meeting on March 24 and approved by the Congregation.

Dick Scudder and Rosalie Kuehn agreed to provide assistance to Fran Way with the Membership Committee. This will also provide Regina Kilmartin some much needed help with the paperwork generated for new members. Regina is also requesting help with possibly preparing the Connections monthly newsletter. The work involved is overwhelming and very time consuming. If you would be willing to assist with the newsletter, please s ee Regina.

All Faiths has been asked to be a hub once again for petitions - this time for Medicaid expansion to be placed on the ballot. The Board voted to allow the forms to be dropped off and picked up at All Faiths.

We still are awaiting the parking lot resurfacing and the installation of the side door.

This is my last Board *Notes* article as I end my term as your Board Chairperson. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve all of you. There are so many people who have supported, mentored, and helped me these last two years. All Faiths has survived many hurdles and moved forward strong and successful. I look forward to my new role as Past Chair and to mentoring our new Chairperson as I was supported. Thank you!

I pondered this quote and realized that there is a deep truth within it. A truth that is disruptive because it pushes one to accept a truth that we may not be ready to embrace.

Disrupt is an interesting word, derived from medieval Latin meaning to break apart. With that definition in mind, it is not surprising that an-

cestral memory reminds us that the word is forceful. And of course, no one wants to feel forced to do or say anything. Yet without such a tendency to change, everything would remain the same.

For me disruption is equivalent to change. We live in a world of constant disruption, continuous change evident in all of nature, which includes ourselves. FOR THE HOMELESS NEWS

March provided several opportunities for the congregation to learn about or support those without housing.

Over 350 T-shirts were collected the first two Sundays of March. The team sorted them by size and on 3-21-24 Susan Meissner delivered them to Matt Wallace with the county's Homeless Outreach Team -- he was overwhelmed. When asked what other items would be helpful, he said bug spray with DEET. (I see an insect repellent collection in the near future!)

Terryln Baah-Acheamfour, with the Salvation Army's day program, spoke at our March 24th Sunday service about the services and changes to that program. People who have been chronically without housing are receiving help to stabilize their lives.

On March 27, a few of us toured the soon-to-be-opened Women's and Children's shelter that St. Mathew's House is developing in Fort Myers.

And, the bike collection continues! Brian Bigelow delivered six bikes this month to the bike rehab program at North Shore Alliance Church in No. Fort Myers.

The congregation has generously supported this team's mission through financial support of Share the Plate and periodic collections of useful items for those living on the street. If this issue speaks to you in any small way, our team of three to four people would love to see you at a monthly meeting. New people bring new perspectives, ask new questions, and bring new energy. CLIMATE ACTION TEAM NEWS

The annual celebration of EARTH DAY on April 22nd makes April a time of heightened awareness of the beauty, magnificence and importance of our natural environment. Your Climate Action Team exists because of the everincreasing existential threat to that precious environment from climate change. Much of CAT's effort goes into finding and promoting solutions to that threat.

In honor of EARTH DAY we are holding a special film screening for the congregation on Monday, April 15th at 6:00 p.m. of the recent documentary "Common Ground." We hope you will join us for this special celebratory event as we explore ways to protect and renew the earth that sustains us. Here is the Rotten Tomatoes review of the film:

"Common Ground is the highly anticipated sequel to the juggernaut success documentary, Kiss the Ground, which touched over 1 billion people globally and inspired the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to put \$20 billion toward soil health. By fusing journalistic exposé with deeply personal stories from those on the front lines of the food movement, Common Ground unveils a dark web of money, power, and politics behind our broken food system. The film reveals how unjust practices forged our current farm system in which farmers of all colors are literally dying to feed us. The film profiles a hopeful and uplifting movement of white, black, and indigenous farmers who are using alternative "regenerative" models of agriculture that could balance the climate, save our health, and stabilize America's economy -- before it's too late.

"The ultimate test of man's conscience may be his willingness to sacrifice something today for future generations whose words of thanks will not be heard."

LIFE: NEHEMIAH ACTION April 9, 2024 - 6 pm – 8 pm Unity of Fort Myers, 11120 Ranchette Road, Fort Myers

On April 9th, LIFE will hold its annual Nehemiah Action. At each year's Action, an influential person (e.g., a government official) is asked to implement a change in policy or pass legislation that will improve the lives of Lee County residents. Per the network members' vote at LIFE's Fall Rally, this year's "ask" will focus on improving the community's mental health situation.



LIFE's Mental Health Action Team interviewed local mental health professionals and persons who have had interactions, either for themselves or for family members, with the mental health system. Both mental health providers and system users said that law enforcement routinely handcuffs persons who are being admitted to a facility using the Baker Act even if the person being committed is cooperative and poses no danger. That action creates more trauma for a person who is already in stress.

Thus, LIFE will ask law enforcement leaders to amend their department's policy to end the practice of handcuffing persons being committed using the Baker Act if they do not pose a threat to others or themselves and are being cooperative. By attending the Nehemiah Action, you help demonstrate that many people are concerned about this practice.

The goal is to have several hundred people at the Action. Therefore, each attendee is asked to bring three additional attendees to the Nehemiah Action.

- Revenue/Operating Income and Expenses:
- The annual premiums for the Wind, Liability and Flood Insurance were paid in February totaling \$12,607.39; this caused the monthly expenses to exceed the monthly income. Budget control was good in February.
- Our Pledge Goal for 2023-2024 (April to March) was \$203,509 and as of 3/15/2024 \$176,526 (86.7%) has been received.
- Several new accounts were created at Live Oak to generate increased interest income. The 1 Year CD rate is 5.0%. And the Savings rate is currently at 4.0%
- The monthly transfer/deposit of \$1,250.00 to the Live Oak Capital Reserve account was made. A contract has been issued to repave the parking lot and we now expect that this work will be completed by March 2024. In addition, we have contracted for new front doors and a new side door which we expect to have installed in March. There were no Capital expenses in February.
- In February, \$1,801.00 was collected for the Minister's Discretionary Fund.

UUA OFFERS SPACE IN HEADQUARTERS BUILDING FOR TEMPORARY EMERGENCY HOUSING

March 4, 2024

On March 1, 2024, the United Way announced a coordinated effort with the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), the Black Refugee & Immigrant Community Coalition, and the Greater Boston YMCA among other community-based organizations, to provide temporary emergency housing and support to approximately 25 families with children who have an urgent and immediate need for shelter in Boston.

UUA Executive Vice President Carey McDonald said of the decision to join in this emergency effort, "In our faith tradition, Unitarian Universalists commit to uphold the inherent worthiness and dignity of every person, to embrace interconnectedness, and to strive for justice, equity and compassion in human relations. Those values are fundamental to our religious practice, and they call us to take action in the face of oppression, injustice and suffering.

All children deserve a safe place to sleep. As a religious community headquartered in Boston, we consider it an act of faithful witness to use our facilities to do our part to support families in need, including migrant families who are simply seeking safety for their loved ones. We hope other building owners will take seriously whether their space can also be used in this way."

This work is carried out through the United Way's SafetyNet Shelter Grant program, which is available to families who have been determined eligible for the state's Emergency Assistance (EA) family shelter program but could not be immediately placed in an EA shelter due to a lack of availability.

APRIL 8, 2024... A TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN!



On Monday April 8, 2024 a total solar eclipse will cross North America. The eclipse will be seen across portions of Mexico, the central and eastern United States, and southeastern Canada. The path of totality will first enter the United States in Texas, then advance northeast across the Mississippi and Ohio Valleys and reach New York State during the mid-afternoon.

A solar eclipse occurs when the Moon passes between the Earth and the Sun at just the right time and orientation, with the Moon casting a shadow on a portion of the Earth's

surface. Sometimes, the Moon only blocks part of the visible face of the Sun, which results in a partial solar eclipse. On more rare occasions, the Moon entirely blocks the face of the Sun and results in a total solar eclipse. Places in the path of totality, including most of Western and North Central NY, will experience several minutes of darkened sky similar to the twilight seen before sunrise or after sunset. If we have clear skies on the day of the eclipse, an incredible view of the Sun's corona will be seen during the few minutes of totality. The Sun's corona is normally not visible, except during a total solar eclipse. The corona is wispy, white streamers of plasma (charged gas) that radiate out from the surface of the sun.
