The Board of Directors met on May 17, 2023, at 1:00 p.m.

The congregation is forming a Program Support Team to provide a pool of members to help with planning, setup, break down, and cleanup for events. Michelle Gemma and Barb McFarlane have stepped forward to coordinate this group. Please see them to join the team or sign up on the bulletin board. If anyone is interested in organizing a 4th of July cookout, please contact Michelle or Barb.

We need to form a Fundraising Team. We particularly need people to organize and plan ahead for our annual auction to raise money for our operating budget.

The UUA General Assembly will be held June 21-25 in Pittsburgh. The Finance Committee recommended, and the board ap-

proved, \$250 scholarships to each of our four attendees. The funds came from a \$600 special collection taken last year, but not used, \$300 that was budgeted for scholarships, and a \$100 personal donation for a total of \$1,000. Marsha Bates, Chris Stotler, Sharon Gray and Albie Johnson will be the recipients. Albie will attend remotely, and Marsha, Chris and Sharon will attend in person as delegates. We are grateful for their participation.

The Board voted that All Faiths should recognize that we are situated on Calusa land with the following Land Acknowledgment: "We honor and greet the ancestors and descendants of the Calusa people whose land we are grateful to call our home. We honor your legacy." The statement will be included in the Order of

Service and recited during services at the Worship Associates' discretion.

Once Susan Anthony, our CPA consultant, closes the books for the last fiscal year, the annual financial review will take place. John Conrad will contact Ed Kleinow and one or two other volunteers to perform the review.

It is essential that we find a new minister soon. The Board recommended that the Search Team advertise outside of the UUA job boards. This option was presented to the Search Committee and advertising will be placed in additional formats.

Work to resurface and stripe the parking lot should begin in June, as will some interior repairs to the ceilings and walls. The board also approved replacing the kitchen countertops at the same time.

The Board will receive CPR training (uncertified) at All Faiths on October 14, 2023, from 9am to 12pm. We will have some space available for interested members. Check your emails or newsletter for details.

An updated "progressive" flag will replace the rainbow flag on our pole. The new flag represents LGBTQ, trans and trans people of color.

I will be unavailable for the next several weeks. If you have issues that you need to bring to the Board of Directors, please contact Michelle Gemma.

The next Board of Directors meeting is June 21, 2023. We will not meet in July.

We are expanding the visibility of our search by placing ads on job board sites (Indeed, ZipRecruiter, etc). CLIMATE ACTION TEAM NEWS

In March of this year the Climate Action Team resumed its series of monthly film screenings which had been postponed due to the pandemic. These documentaries about various aspects of the climate crisis are made available through the online organization Interfaith Power

& Light. The film we screened in May, *Kiss the Ground*, is a compelling documentary about regenerative agriculture Produced in 2020, the farming practices explored in the film remain powerfully relevant to the future health and sustainability of our planet and, indeed, to our own survival. Kiss the Ground shows how regenerating the world's soils has the potential to rapidly stabilize Earth's climate, restore lost ecosystems and create abundant food supplies. This film explains why transitioning to regenerative agriculture could be key in rehabilitating the planet, while simultaneously invigorating a new sense of hope and inspiration for the future. The film is currently available on Netflix. We urge you to view it if possible.

Joining us for this screening was Graham Scott, a Board member of our partner organization, the SWFL RESET Center and a volunteer at the ECHO Global Farm in North Fort Myers where he leads tours of visitors and FGCU students. ECHO introduces sustainable plants, techniques, and technologies to farmers around the world who are struggling to feed their families. Graham suggested that our Climate Action Team tour the facility sometime in the future. Look for more information about an ECHO tour later in the year.

In the discussion following the film screening a question arose about how we can support regenerative farming in our community. Is organic farming the same as regenerative agriculture? The answer is "not necessarily." Produce labeled "organic" must meet federal standards which do not include soil regeneration. However, farms growing organic produce may also be using regenerative agriculture. There may be a new "regenerative organic" label in the future. For now, spreading the word about the importance of restoring the health of our soils is paramount. CAT will be looking for ways to help accomplish that.

Our next CAT meeting will take place on ZOOM at 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 6th. Everyone is welcome to participate. We hope you will join us.

RACIAL EQUITY TEAM NEWS

The Racial Equity Team had an interesting May meeting. We took a look at the situation of renters in New York City from an article in The Nation. and followed legislation in our state legislature, which governs renters in Florida, both short-term and long-term. We discovered that renters are not getting the support of local or state governments. In fact, the Florida legislature removed local rental protection. By striking down a "Tenants Bill of Rights", and giving themselves sole authority to approve such legislation in the future, they have made it very difficult for renters in our state. Renters are those in our community who are not able to buy and are forced to rent - often at a great disadvantage. I am wondering how this will affect tenants who will be renting with funds from the newly activated "Housing Trust Fund".

We discussed the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), and its impact on local communities, including our congregation. We discovered that there is much to be gained from the act, including provisions that can help projects we are currently working on. The list would include clean air, clean water and clean energy. There is help to obtain rooftop solar energy, to buy a used electric vehicle, to secure green spaces, and possibly to remove lead pipes in homes, and much more.

We discussed the Infrastructure ACT (IA) which should be of real interest to Floridians. One of the main concerns of the IA is removal of Lead Service Lines. Funding is handled through the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund, and Florida will receive major funding for this. The intent is to remove or replace all the nation's lead pipe service lines over the next decade.

Florida has emerged as the state with the most lead service lines in the nation, according to the survey recently released by the EPA. In 2021, the state told the National Resource Defense Council (NRDC) that it doesn't track lead service lines. The usual thinking is that these lead service lines would be in older communities, but from the previous statements they could be anywhere.

I have noticed an increase in infrastructure activity in the city of Fort Myers, as well as in Lee county, with regard to ground water, drainage, and sewage drainage. There are many areas in need of infrastructure services. This will be of much help to our goal of obtaining clean water.

Pam Pfalzer and Susan have had a lot of fun and success negotiating for sleeping bags at thrift stores. These will also be given to the county's outreach team that Matt Wallace leads. (Matt spoke at All Faiths earlier this year). Let them know if you'd like to accompany them on a "thrifting" trip.

Judy Alberda seems to make connections with people and agencies serving those without housing wherever she goes. As a result, we have someone in mind to speak in the future, know what items people need the most, and have contacts with a few agencies.

Tina Noel is waiting to hear from other LIFE Congregations about their outreach or ministries to people without housing.

If you have ideas on ways to support this vulnerable population, please join us.

This team will meet at 1pm. June 15. The team will not meet in July or August.

ALL FAITHS DELEGATES HEADED TO GA!

All Faiths will be represented at this year's UUA General Assembly in Pittsburg, PA. This year, due to a drop in membership, we are only allowed three delegates. We are very fortunate to have three seasoned representatives this year. *Chris Stotler*, *Marsha Bates* and *Sharon Gray* all have experience as past delegates and GA attendees. This year we are equally fortunate to have our Director of Child & Youth Programs, *Albie Johnson*, also attend remotely.



It is always to our advantage to have representatives at the annual General Assembly. It's a great opportunity to learn, connect, collaborate, and network with other UUs -maybe even find a minister!

This year a new UUA President will be elected, as well as the UUA's Chief Executive Officer. They are tasked with helping to lead our Association on a path to Beloved Community, in which people of diverse backgrounds, identities and theological beliefs can thrive.

One candidate for election was announced by the Presidential Search Committee (PSC) on November 15, 2022: the *Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt*. You can read the PSC announcement and the UUA Board of Trustees' statement on the nomination by visiting the UUA.org website.

No additional candidates were nominated by petition. Rev. Dr. Betancourt was nominated by the UUA Presidential Search Committee on November 15, 2022. Rev. Betancourt accepted the nomination. As previously announced, a second candidate identified by the Presidential Search Committee did not accept the nomination.

No additional candidates for UUA President qualified to run by petition. Individuals were able to become a candidate for UUA President by receiving petition signatures from fifty congregations in three regions of the Association between December 1, 2022 and February 1, 2023. No petitions were submitted by the February 1, 2023 deadline.

As the UUA Secretary announced that a referendum election on Rev. Dr. Betancourt's nomination would be held this year. This will ensure delegates can participate in our democratic process on behalf of their congregation. For this election, the ballot will open starting June 1, 2023, and will conclude at a posted time on Saturday, June 24, 2023 during General Assembly. Delegates will have the opportunity to express their support for or against Rev. Dr. Betancourt's candidacy. This is consistent with the UUA Board of Trustees' November statement about assuring that an election oc-

curs.

And, of course, the big issue at stake this year is the 2023 Proposed Revision of Article II of the UUA Bylaws.

The UUA Bylaws were adopted when the Universalist Church in America and the American Unitarian Association merged in 1961. Article II established vital characteristics of the new UUA and outlined the original 6 Principles that reflected its fundamental beliefs and aspirations. There were

significant disagreements over content that nearly derailed the merger process. Article II must be reviewed at least every 15 years.

In 1967, Section 4 was added to Article II, opposing discrimination and affirming inclusivity.

Efforts to update the 6 Principles began in the 1970s, focusing initially on eliminating sexist language. The revised 7 Principles and original 5 Sources were adopted at General Assembly (GA) in 1985 with wide popular support.

A 6th Source, Earth-centered spirituality, was added in 1995 at GA.

An Article II Study Commission formed in 2006 but delegates rejected its revisions at GA in 2009.

In 2013, at GA, the Article II section on "Non-Discrimination" became "Inclusion."

Separately in 2013, an 8th Principle was drafted centering anti-racism in the UUA. In 2017 a Responsive Resolution passed at GA calling for a Study Commission to consider adding the 8th Principle to Article II.

The current Article II Study Commission started in 2019 and the Commission was launched in 2020, just as COVID hit. Its work period was extended with the final report due in 2023, rather than in 2022.

The proposed Article II revision will be considered at General Assembly in Pittsburgh in June, 2023 and voted on by delegated representing UU congregations from across the country.

If the Article II revisions are approved by a majority of delegates voting on it in 2023, it will be stand for a final approval at General Assembly in 2024.

If approved at the 2024 General Assembly by a majority of delegates, the proposed Article II revision would replace the current Article II in the UUA Bylaws.

CELEBRATE JUNETEENTH!

June 19, 2023



On "Freedom's Eve," or the eve of January 1, 1863, the first Watch Night services took place. On that night, enslaved and free African Americans gathered in churches and private homes all across the country awaiting news that the Emancipation Proclamation had taken effect. At the stroke of midnight, prayers were answered as all enslaved people in Confederate States were declared legally free. Union soldiers, many of whom were black, marched onto plantations and across cities in the south reading small copies of the **Emancipation Proclamation** spreading the news of freedom in Confederate States. Only through the Thirteenth Amendment did emancipation end slavery throughout the United States.

But not everyone in Confederate territory would immediately be free. Even though the Emancipation Proclamation was made effective in 1863, it could not be implemented in places still under Confederate control. As a result, in the westernmost Confederate state of Texas, enslaved people would not be free until much later. Freedom finally came on June 19, 1865, when some 2,000 Union troops arrived in Galveston Bay, Texas. The army announced that the more than 250,000 enslaved black people in the state, were free by executive decree. This day came to be known as "Juneteenth," by the newly freed people in Texas.

The post-emancipation period known as Re-construction (1865 - 1877) marked an era of great hope, uncertainty, and struggle for the nation as a whole. Formerly enslaved people immediately sought to reunify families, establish schools, run for political office, push radical legislation and even sue slaveholders for compensation. Given the 200+years of enslavement, such

changes were nothing short of amazing. Not even a generation out of slavery, African Americans were inspired and empowered to transform their lives and their country.

Juneteenth marks our country's second independence day. Although it has long celebrated in the African American community, this monumental event remains largely unknown to most Americans.

The historical legacy of Juneteenth shows the value of never giving up hope in uncertain times. The National Museum of African American History and Culture is a community space where this spirit of hope lives on. A place where historical events like Juneteenth are shared and new stories with equal urgency are told.
