### **BOARD NOTES** by Chris Stotler, Board Chair

Your Board of Directors held its regular meeting on March 16 at All Faiths. It was good to meet sitting around a table.

The Board approved the revised proposed budget for next year (2022-2023) at \$245,093 which will be presented at the Annual Meeting for approval. This budget was reduced by \$5,000 because the mortgage will be paid off this month. This is a great accomplishment for All Faiths. A big thank you goes out to everyone who contributed to the "Burn-the-Mortgage" campaign and those who gave extra so it would be paid this year, not a couple years from now.

You also came through with the stewardship pledge drive. We achieved almost 90% of the pledge goal. This is the highest percentage that I remember. The Stewardship Committee did a great job with the Pledge Drive and the follow-up process. The Board approved refurbishing our sign near the sidewalk in front. The color of the central panel is fading and needs replacement. We also approved a small change to the logo. The words "Where You Belong" will be added. The cost will fall within the general maintenance budget.

The Board approved expenditures up to \$5,500 from the Legacy Fund for installing pavers or a cement pad in the area that was formerly the deck. The Board received one bid and expect to receive another around March 28. Previously we received two gifts totaling over \$3,000 towards deck demolition and replacement. The Legacy Fund received a gift of \$10,000 from the Ed Fulker Estate; a portion of that will go towards the patio.

The Board discussed the need for several individuals to work with the Stewardship Committee as a subgroup to encourage gifts to the Legacy Fund. The subgroup can assist individuals who wish to contribute to the fund with the process, although they cannot give the donor legal advice. All of us should think about how important All Faiths is to our lives and whether we want to leave part of our estate or give a living gift to the All Faiths Legacy Fund.

A retreat for the new board is planned for April 15. There will be no costs to All Faiths associated with the retreat.

The Board approved modifying the Robinson Room to be a combination classroom and conference room equipped with a large screen TV, camera and laptop. This will enable its use for hybrid meetings and classes.

A fund raiser for April 30 was approved. It will be a Disco Night, an inspiration from Rev. CJ's message of several weeks ago. It should be a lot of fun with food, drinks, music, and hopefully some dancing. You do not need to be a disco dancer to come and contribute to the fun. Rachel reported on the activities of the Child and Youth Program (CYP) Committee. They are organizing a class on Buddhism for home schoolers. They are looking into other options. The Board will ask Kathy Fanny to periodically report to the Board on CYP activities to keep the Board more connected to the CYP.

Eileen Moran and Ernie Reid and will be leaving the Board the end of March. Diane Cartwright has served as the Past President ex-officio position for the past four years. I will move from Chair of the Board to her position as a non-voting member of the Board. # FROM MCGREGOR BOULEVARD

I envy Christian ministers this time of year. When the April newsletter deadline rolls around they can turn to the liturgical calendar and hit upon dozens of messages and images related to Jesus' resurrection to use for newsletter and Easter Sunday sermon material. Then there is the Unitarian Universalist minister. Our tradition doesn't have a liturgical calendar to consult and how does one reach such a theologically diverse congregation with a single message? What about a resurrection message? After all it is Easter – a memorial of the resurrection since ancient times.

I find the variety of stories and interpretations of Jesus' resurrection intriguing and sometimes comical. Take, for example, the story of one young Unitarian Universalist. His Sunday school teacher was teaching a lesson about Easter and asked her class: "Who knows the story of Easter?" The boy jumped up and down waving his hand as he knew he had the answer. The teacher called on him and he replied: "Easter is the holiday where Jesus comes out of his cave and if he sees his shadow we will have six more weeks of winter."

I like this story. It's a bit misguided but downright funny! It reminds me that each of us has our own resurrection story. You may share the Christian belief that Jesus died and was resurrected, or you may simply see this as one of many stories. No matter what we believe, the proof of victory over death is visible and unavoidable. This season of "rising again" allows us to witness the miracles that are around us. Perhaps we miss seeing these miracles because they are so ordinary and familiar. Let us be witness to the miracle of resurrection and create our own Easter stories.

## **CLIMATE ACTION TEAM NEWS**

Your Climate Action Team sponsored two very informative activities in March. The first was a guided tour on March 4 of the Lee County Waste Management Recycling Center. We had the opportunity to learn just what goes on in the facility when the stuff we have thrown away arrives there,

and to ask questions about what does and does not belong in our recycle bins. One of the most welcome things we learned was that we do not have to ruin our fingernails trying to remove those pesky glued-on paper labels from recyclable containers. We observed conveyor belts in constant motion, lined by dedicated, hard-working staff members plucking ineligible items and setting them aside as the stream of material delivered by garbage trucks whizzed by. Prior to our departure the facility gifted us with sturdy tote bags decorated with pictures and information stating plainly the five categories of recyclable materials, and what items qualify in each category. After our tour we treated ourselves to a delicious lunch at Buckingham Farms restaurant just up the road. This event was both educational and enjoyable, and we are thinking of repeating it in the near future for those who didn't have a chance to participate this time.

Then on March 22 we presented a screening of the Interfaith Power & Light film "Kiss the Ground" in our sanctuary, followed by a wide-ranging discussion. The topic was regenerative agriculture, and the film makes a convincing case for this "old is new again" farming technique that has life-saving potential for our planet and its inhabitants. We were joined by Gary Robbins of the SWFL RESET Center, one of our partner organizations, who filled us in on the various activities that group is involved in and invited us to join them. If you couldn't make it to this screening, the film is available on Netflix and is very well-worth watching. Look for an announcement of the next CAT-sponsored film screening and discussion which will take place later this month.

There is another exciting event happening at All Faiths this coming Saturday, April 2, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., with lunch provided. The Pachamama Alliance has invited our congregation to a symposium entitled "Awakening the Dreamer". We will learn new ways of thinking about our culture and how it impacts the environment and our relationships with one another, and our future as inhabitants of this planet. #### **FOR THE HOMELESS NEWS** by Barb McFarlane

As we wrap up this fiscal year, once again All Faiths' members generously donated money, household items, hygiene products, bikes, socks and food to support those without housing. We also advocated for affordable housing and homeless people with elected officials.

Since last April, members donated \$445 to this team. This money was spent on school uniforms as well as donations to organizations serving people without housing. Angel Wings was the recipient of the team's Share-the-Plate collection this year.

In June All Faiths members donated 224 hygiene products. These were brought to the Salvation Army's Day Resource Center and Triage shelter.

The bike ministry resulted in members and neighbors providing 80 bikes since last April. Bikes were given to the All Souls church's homeless outreach program, the Salvation Army Triage shelter, the Sheriff's Department and Robert Hipperts Bicycle Ministry.

There was a huge response to the request for household items in March. St. Vincent de Paul used most of them in "gift bags" for their event celebrating those who found housing this year. Other items were given to Grace Church Thrift store. St. Vincent de Paul partners with Grace Thrift by giving clients vouchers to use there.

All Faiths Unitarian Congregation's Annual Meeting was held Sunday, March 27, 2022 at 9:30 am. Chris Stotler, Chair of the Board of Directors, presided over the meeting. Rev. CJ McGregor read words of wisdom as the chalice was lit.

The following actions were taken:


- Approval of the minutes from the 2021 Annual Meeting.
- Approval of the \$245,093 budget for fiscal year 2022-23.
- Acceptance of the slate of nominees for Directors and Treasurer as proposed by the Nominating Committee. No additional nominations were received from the floor.
- Election of John Conrad (2<sup>nd</sup> term) as Treasurer and the following Directors for twoyear terms: Marge DiGalbo (2<sup>nd</sup> term), Linda Runkle (2<sup>nd</sup> term), Michelle Gemma (1<sup>st</sup> term), and Lewis Robinson (1<sup>st</sup> term). Judy Alberda was elected to a one-year term.
- Approval and election of the slate of nominees for the Nominating Committee.
   Members elected Lisa Leonhardt (2<sup>nd</sup> term) and Carol Heilsberg (1<sup>st</sup> term) to serve on that Committee.
- Approval of the new Mission Statement: "All Faiths Unitarian Congregation is committed to Justice, Equity, and Compassion."
- Approval of the following Vision Statement after discussion and modification of the proposed statement: "Recognizing our role as each other's keepers, we strive to be an inclusive, loving, spiritual community working to bring harmony to the world."

Rev. CJ McGregor read the names of members who died during the past year as the Rites of Passage. Those remembered included Dick Ashton, Ed Fulker, Elaine Leventhal, Edith Rood, and Vivian Sawaya.

After the chalice was extinguished, the meeting adjourned at approximately 10:10 am.

#### LEE INTERFAITH FOR EMPOWERMENT by Marsha Bates

Thank you to all who attended LIFE's March 15th Nehemiah Action whether in person or online.

At the Nehemiah Action, four council members (Johnny Streets, Teresa Watkins-Brown, Darla Bonk, and Mayor Anderson) indicated willingness to modify the Affordable Housing Trust Fund Ordinance to address some of LIFE's concerns with the ordinance that was passed at the end of January.

Three of the council members said they will support immediately placing the promised \$1.5 million into the trust fund immediately. All four indicated willingness to work toward identifying viable on-going funding sources for the affordable housing trust fund. They are also willing to modify the ordinance to ensure a larger portion of the funds will go to persons earning 80 percent or less of the area's average median income. LIFE also asked that council modify the voucher portion of the affordable housing ordinance to eliminate the \$400 per month cap. Instead, LIFE asked that council consider using a sliding scale based on a person's income so those most in need would receive more assistance each month.

Although we left the Nehemiah Action with promises of support, continued vigilance is needed to ensure the promises become a reality. Be prepared to support LIFE future actions ... attending council meetings, writing letters, etc., as we endeavor to make affordable housing a reality.

- Revenue/Operating Income **increased** in February compared to January.
  - We have received 97.5% of the pledge goal for the first 11 months of the year (\$186,792 in pledge contributions, while our anticipated pledge goal through February was \$191,583). Thank you for all of your continued and sustained support!!
  - Some of the increase in Revenue is from early **Where You Belong** Pledge giving 2022-2023.
- The outstanding mortgage principal at the end of February was \$9,807. This reflects significant progress because on April 1, 2021 the mortgage principal balance was \$86,896 (a decrease of \$77,089 in just 11 months)! The response to the Burn the Mortgage campaign has been incredible. It is with increasing hope that we can achieve our goal of being debt free by the end of our fiscal year. Thank you to all that have been so generous. And as of March 14 2022, the Mortgage balance has dropped further to approximately \$1,815 (taking into account promised checks that we will be receiving)! Can we cross the finish line and Burn the Mortgage by March 31?
- The Capital Reserve Study, approved by the Board earlier this year, has been completed. The Finance Committee and the Board are now hoping to incorporate the funding of the reserves into the budget for the 2022/2023 fiscal year. The reserves, once implemented, will be used for future anticipated capital expenses, such as replacement of A/C units, roofs, carpeting, et cetera.
- In February \$2,627 was collected for the Minister's Discretionary Fund.

## SUPPORTING THOSE IMPACTED BY THE CRISIS IN UKRAINE

As the situation in Ukraine has unfolded over the last several days, there has been an outpouring of prayers and concern from Unitarian Universalists expressing heartfelt unity around this growing human rights tragedy. We want to share the most up-to-date information on how UUs in this country and around the world are responding and amplify the ways that we can all help.

As Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, president of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), said, "we continue to join in solidarity with so many around the world and pray for the people of Ukraine. Our hearts go out to those who are enduring devastating loss of life, violence, instability, and upheaval due to Russia's unprovoked invasion. Our UU faith calls us to remain committed to justice and we believe we have a moral responsibility to support the creation of peace and the equal rights of all people."

Russia's invasion of Ukraine is a stark reminder that human rights are fundamentally linked to our interdependence. Over the last few weeks, while we have seen tremendous acts of courage and generosity by and towards the people of Ukraine, we have also seen the worst of human behavior. We continue to be mindful that an authoritarian, imperialistic ideology that seeks to deny Ukrainians their rights to live free and independently, under the false, anti-Semitic guise of "denazification," is directly tied to colonialist ideologies globally and here in the U.S. that endanger the health, wellbeing, and lives of BIPOC individuals, members of the LG-BTQIA+ community, and other marginalized populations.

And as millions of people living in Ukraine flee to safety, we know that, on top of an already dangerous situation, there are life-threatening experiences of anti-Blackness, racism, and xenophobia that are blocking escape from the deadly conflict.

The scope of this humanitarian crisis is staggering. To help address the scale of the crisis, the UUA has been working closely with our partners at the UU Service Committee, which is dedicated to advancing human rights and social justice, together with an international community of grassroots partners and advocates. They have created an Emergency Relief Fund to support Ukraine and we are committed to amplifying their voice and humanitarian work. The international implications of Russia's war in Ukraine are profound. The UUA's International office has additional resources for supporting Ukrainians who have been forced to flee their homes and communities, including information on supporting the Hungarian Unitarian Church and the International Women's Convocation's Faithify Campaign.

As more information becomes available, we will make sure to provide updates on our efforts, including on our Facebook page. We ask that you continue to hold in your hearts the people of Ukraine and all of those around the world who are suffering because of war and injustice. And we ask that you pray for peace as we all hold each other in mutual care.
